Carpenter Sends "On The Spot" Report From War Crime Trials

The eyes of America, and indeed of the entire world, have been focused on the history-making war crimes trials in Germany. While we in Farmington have been following them through the columns of our daily newspaper Bill did most of us know that one of our own boys, then serving with the Army of occupation forces in Germany, was also following the war crimes trials. The difference is that Bill William Carpenter has had the opportunity to attend the trials in person, and the best we can do is to read an account written by someone who was there - or more likely, who had received his information via wire from one of the reporters covering the trials.

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Carpenter of 33429 Shilwaukee, Bill interestingly told how he had been sent fighting on the estate formerly occupied by Herman Goering. It was the very next day that he attended the war crimes trial.
