Mr. Joe Boltz, of the Detroit School system and a staff member of Wayne University, was the speaker at last week's meeting of the Farmington Kivans Club. Mr. Boltz was introduced by Program Chairman Pete Kobman.

"Citizenship" was the subject of the speaker, and he outlined a program that is now being instituted experimentally in the Detroit schools, and is under the observation of leading educators throughout the nation. Under the program different groups of students have been given supervised instruction on the various types of citizenship education. They are using open forums, discussion groups, vocational training, and other means for taking up such problems as fact finding, occupation study, and immediate projects, as for example cleaning up their schools, and their own homes. The pupils are started on this program as early as possible, many of the groups being composed of grade pupils, and they are taught to do their own thinking along these lines.

Mr. Boltz told of how extremely interesting it is to sit in on one of the forum group discussions, which are participated in by pupils only. The citizenship training teaches the students how to identify facts from propaganda and how to recognize this for themselves, it teaches them where to obtain the information they seek, and it also schools them in the extremely important phase of citizenship of individual responsibility.

Paul Schreiber will be chairman of the October 23 meeting and will present a 40-minute movie, in technicolor of the Amazon River.

Rev. Elsie Johns is confined to Highland Park Hospital where she underwent surgery Monday.

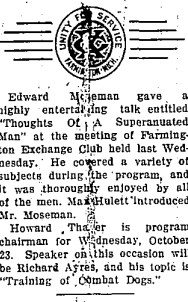
The young folks of the community got out to Miss Johns.

Vegetable Storage For storing potatoes, cabbage and root crops, the requirements are low temperature (40 degrees is ideal), enough moisture to prevent wilting, and enough ventilation to occasionally draw off foul air. The best storage is in a basement room, but where there is no heater to warm or dry the air. The coolest part of a basement is on the floor, but the boxes or baskets should be raised a few inches to allow for air-space beneath.

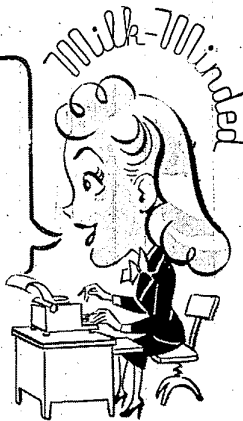

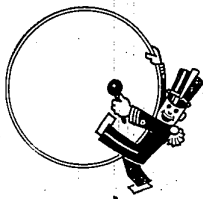
