March Of Dimes Campaign Gets Under Way Here

Civic Theatre Has Special Collection

Farmington's 1947 March of Dimes Campaign got under way here on Monday with approximately 50 canisters being distributed throughout the City and Township Friday and Saturday, March 21 and 22. Civic Theatre chairman announced this week that a total of \$166.57 has already been collected through the cooperation of the Civic Theatre and various groups and individuals, to quote the civic theatre's publicity drive. On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday volunteers from Senior Girl Scout Troop No. 1, Noble District Troop 11, Our Lady of Sorrows Troop No. 4, and numerous other individuals, collected contributions at the Civic Theatre. The collections were made by the volunteers as they moved through the theatre.

No definite goal has been set for the Farmington drive, Taylor said. However he emphasized that every effort was being made to meet the year's quota. The demands are greater this year than ever before," Taylor stated. This is due to the heavy demands that were placed on the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, during the past year. The purpose of this year's drive is to reestablish the fund so that aid can be given to the dreaded disease strikes again.

Taylor added that 50 per cent of the money raised during the March of Dimes Campaign in Farmington will be sent to the National Foundation for use here. A considerable amount of money was spent on local victims of infantile paralysis in the past year.

The Farmington drive will continue until Saturday, February 8. Taylor urges all residents of Farmington to watch for the canisters in their local stores and business places and to give generously to the Farmington campaign. If you can not locate a canister in your area, send your contribution to the Farmington March of Dimes, c/o Mrs. Richard H. Taylor, Farmington, Michigan.

The 50 per cent not retained by the local chapters from the March of Dimes drive, goes to the National Foundation for the purpose of a fund of research and study of infantile paralysis. The National Foundation aids local communities in epidemic emergencies and translates the material into the language of those communities to fight the dreaded disease. It provides funds for the training of physicians and nurses in modern methods of treatment of the disease. The work is primarily supported by contributions from the American people, during the annual March of Dimes Campaign.

Under the direction of Mrs. William Harris, they are making new collections now, and this time they are collecting needles, pins and all kinds of sewing implements, including whatever you wish to contribute, and these will be sent as soon as the collection is completed. Clarenceville Home Ec Unit Is "The Last Word"

The Clarenceville School District is the proud possessor of one of the most modern, and surely one of the most practical Home Economics units of any in this vicinity.

The school district purchased a house, moved it onto the school property, and then went to work to remodel it into a home economics unit. The work is now about completed, and an open house and shower is to be held in the home Thursday night, giving parents and friends an opportunity to see the new unit. The house is a two-story, brick home, and what sort of a project the house is.

The house was not wired for electricity, and accordingly this was one of the first things to be done. The school district has installed lighting fixtures were installed, to conform with the general design of the house.

A utility room at the back of the house was combined with the kitchen to make a room large enough to house the entire cooking unit. This is one of the most attractive and most complete cooking units the school could possibly have. The entire unit consists of new steel cabinets, with plenty of shelf and drawer space. A good supply of dishes has been obtained from others Clubs of the school district, and others from individuals and business concerns who desired to help establish this new unit.

At the present time there are 35 girls in the Home Economics department of Clarenceville High School, but this number is expected to increase with the acquisition of the home and shop department. The new unit gives the girls the opportunity of putting into practice the instructions they receive in home making, whether it be in the form of cooking, sewing, or whether it is the everyday routine of ordinary housekeeping.

As yet the sewing machines have not arrived, but it is expected that four new machines will be put into the unit very soon. The girls have already had considerable training in sewing, and they have made curtains for the kitchen, and other rooms in the house, and as soon as the sewing machines arrive, they will make draperies for the living room.

The living room, dining room and bedroom are attractively furnished with furniture which the school was able to purchase at cost from the DeVoll Furniture Company. LOCAL PILOT TO GO ON FLORIDA AIR TOUR

Designed to encourage cross-country flying, this unusual Air Tour is open to any pilot of a plane of 125 horsepower or less. Several private pilots from all over the country are expected to take part in this flight.
