Trojans Chalk Up Two More Wins

Clarenceville's Trojan Nine boosted its victories to eight for the season out of 10 games by defeating Detroit Lutheran 5 to 1 last Thursday and downing Detroit University school 2 to 1 on Friday.

Chuck Rousseaux was on the mound for Clarenceville yesterday as they played host to Detroit Lutheran. Although the Trojans were out hit by the visitors, they capitalized on bunched hits and errors to win.

The Trojans jumped off to an early lead in their half of the first inning, scoring three runs. Kliesen walked to open the inning. Riddell singled and Rousseaux was safe when he topped the pitcher and the catcher threw to third to lose it.

With the bases loaded Sonnenberg hit to short and when the infielder let the ball go through his legs, Kliesen and Riddell scored. Rousseaux came home when Roberts forced Sonnenberg at second.

Clarenceville added two more runs in the sixth inning. Albers opened the inning with a walk and stole second. Grimshaw singled and Albers advanced to second.

The Trojans jumped to Detroit University school on Friday and although again out hit came back with a victory. Clarenceville was held to one hit, but Detroit University committed two very costly errors.

In the second inning Clarenceville opened the scoring that netted them their two runs and the ball game. Sonnenberg walked and when Albers hit to third, both runners were safe on a fumble. The two runners advanced on a pass ball. Sonnenberg scored when the catcher overthrew third base trying to catch him off.

The Detroit University nine got one run across in the seventh inning for their only score. After two out Detroit got a man on a walk and he came all the way home on a long trip.

FALCON TRINCLADS THE FOR THIRD IN REGIONAL MEET

Farmington High School's track team tied for third place with Howell in the State Regional tournament held Saturday at Ann Arbor High School.

There were nine classes "B" groups competing in the tournament, made up of schools in this region. Besides Farmington, two other Inter-Lakes Conference schools entered the tournament, Walled Lake and Milford.

Adrian won the tournament with 65 1/2 points. Plymouth was second with 42 1/2 points, and Farmington and Howell shared the third place spot with 21 points each.

Preliminaries were run Saturday morning and the final in the afternoon. Farmington winners were as follows: 200 Yard Dash—Wieland, 2nd. 440 Yard Dash—LePrese, 1st. 880 Yard Dash—Howard, 2nd. 1100 Yard Dash—Scott, tied for 3rd.

The Falcon winners will participate in the State meet to be held in East Lansing, Saturday, May 29.

Farmington Nine Defeats Two Inter-Lakes Conference Foes

Farmington's baseball team broke back into the win column last Friday by turning back Holy Trinity 1 to 0 on the Farmington diamond and then defeating Walled Lake 7 to 4 Tuesday afternoon at Walled Lake.

Gene Schorer was selected for honorable mention from the side of the farm, which is suffering from a sore arm. Schorer allowed only one run and three hits in the seven innings he worked.

Farmington opened the scoring in the second inning when Schorer connected with a single and scored on Bertin's double. Holly tied the score in their half of the third inning when third baseman Bryer smashed out a home run.

The Falcons pulled the game out of the fire in their half of the third, scoring four runs. McLean's single, an error, a single by Hier, another error and a final single by Nichols accounted for the runs.

Farmington's final run was picked up in the fifth on a home run to right center field by Greco. Farmington was charged with three errors while Holly made two. The Falcons were active at bat, getting 6 runs on seven hits.

Although Farmington and Walled Lake got only three hits apiece, the Falcons took advantage of walks and errors to easily defeat their hosts on Tuesday.

Gene Schorer, the winning pitcher for Farmington, held the Walled Lake batters to three hits and four runs. Bud Bryant was behind the plate. Schorer struck out four.

The Falcons took an early lead by scoring four runs in the first inning without a hit. Three walks, an error, a stolen base and a timely sacrifice totaled up for the scores. Walled Lake got one back in their half of the first without a hit.

Walled Lake added another run in the third inning and, again in the fourth without getting a safe hit, to come within one run of tying the score.

Traffic Ordinance Effective June 1

Residents are reminded this week that the new Traffic Ordinance No. 232-43, of the City of Farmington, becomes effective on Tuesday, June 1. The ordinance was passed by the City Commission and given final approval at the regular meeting, May 12.

Several new regulations are included in the ordinance, as well as those with which most motorists and pedestrians are already familiar. The complete text of the ordinance appears in last week's issue of The Enterprise, and all motorists should read the sections devoted to rules and regulations for operation of motor vehicles within the city.

BICYCLES GOVERNED One of the sections in the ordinance is devoted to the operation and licensing of bicycles within the city, and here this is a new provision, particular attention is called to it. Persons riding bicycles should ride as near the right side of the roadway as practicable, or if riding on the sidewalk, right of way must be given to pedestrians, and before passing anyone walking on the sidewalk, he must give audible warning. Bicycles must be equipped with lights, and some other warning device, and they must be licensed.
