C'ville Sets District Census

Clarenceville School District, during May, will conduct a door-to-door survey to determine the number of pre-school children within the district.

Survey procedure will be similar to the procedure used previously in the district for census taking. The survey will include children ages from birth to five years of age.

According to Edward Salisz, Clarenceville's business manager, the State of Michigan in 1967 dropped the requirement for an annual school census. Clarenceville, however, needs census information to predict enrollment.

District residents are asked to provide survey takers with the following information: name and birthdate of all children 0-5.

Featured will be pantomimes, songs, jokes and skits. Directing will be Bob Gregory, head of the high school speech and drama department.

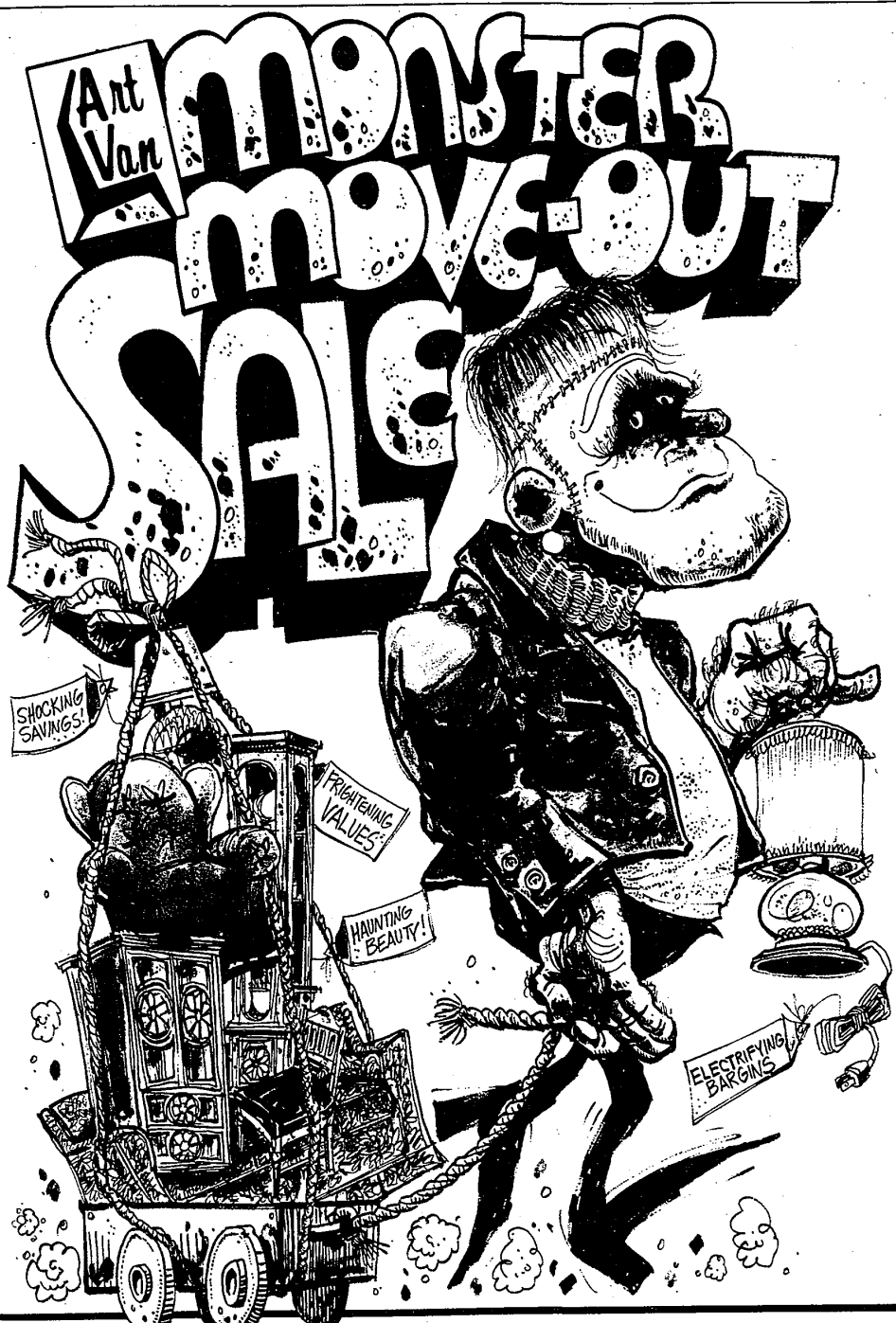
CHS Band Has New Emblem
