Two Performances To Be Given Wednesday

Detailed plans have been completed for the N.J.C. Regular Concert to be held this Wednesday,
October 20, at the Farmington High school auditorium. Wes McLean,
chairman of the program, announced this week.

The concert, sponsored by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce, will bring to Farmington
two outstanding artists of radio. Fred Thomas, sensational N.B.C.
barrister and Robert Drummond, colorful pianist, will present the
concert. Both artists are headliners in radio and both have appeared in
recent Hollywood productions.

TWO PERFORMANCES... Accented to McLean, two performances
will be presented on Wednesday. A matinee will be held
for school children beginning at 3:45 p.m. and an evening performance will be given at 8:00
p.m.

Scouters Hold First Round Table Of Year... The first Scouters Round Table
of the year was held last Wednesday evening at the home of Louis
Gillon, neighborhood Boy Scout Council.

Applications are available at the Farmington High School, and may
be secured now from Mr. Harrison. The program is open to male citizens
of the United States between the ages of 17 and 21, and quotas
of men are available in various states and territory on the basis of
high school population. Those who are successful in passing the
application tests will be given a four year college degree,
if found in all respects qualified, their names will be submitted to
state and Territorial Selection Committees which they may prefer
to attend and Naval officers. The Navy expects to enter about 2,350
students into the program commencing with the fall term of college,
1949.

The students selected by these competitive examinations will be
assigned to the 52 Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps units
which are located in various universities and colleges in the United States. It accepted by the college, they will be appointed Midshipmen, U.S.N.R., and will have
tuition, books and normal fees paid for by the government. In
addition they will receive pay at the rate of \$50.00 a month for the
entire time they are in the program. They may be commissioned as officers
in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and required to serve on
active duty for two years. At the end of this period they may be
retention in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps, or transfer to the
Reserve and return to civilian life.

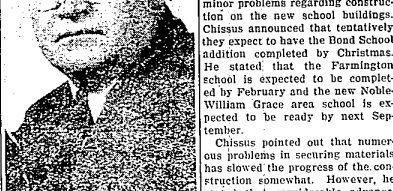
Contractor Sets Tentative Dates For Completion Of School Units
