# New Horizons Closing

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Everyone expressed strong desires to remain in Farmington, especially the parents.

"But instead of complaining, they recognized the reason why the center had to be closed," Denman said. "Their discussion ran along the lines of what they could do to restore this service in the Farmington area."

The parents began by contributing \$1,000 towards a \$12,000 fund to rent and operate a new facility in Farmington.

It has been estimated that a new facility will cost approximately \$1,000 per month. A drive will be conducted to seek 120 patrons to contribute \$100 each. This would enable the center to operate for the first year.

Administrative Assistant Israel Hockman says they are now actively looking for a building, concentrating their search in the Farmington area.

"It's not an easy task. Basically it's a problem of financing," Hockman said. "We hope the drive will be successful and we will get the \$12,000 for the first year. But additional costs will have to come from other sources."

"It will be quite a jump from the \$200 per month we pay now to \$1,000 per month."

Denman estimated they will need a building with 6,000 to 8,000 square feet of floor space. It should be suitable for light industrial use, zoned or rezonable.

physically disabled and will require an elevator if it is a two-story building.

"We really hope to be able to stay in Farmington," Mrs. Prentice said. "We have a good relationship with this community and have established a service for the multiple-handicapped in the area that they might not otherwise have."

Applicants for admission to New Horizons program must be mentally or physically handicapped to the extent that the community considers them presently unemployable.

Minimum age is 16, they must have a social security number, and those under 18 must have a work permit.

Only Oakland County residents are admitted to the full-service program, but non-residents may be accepted for evaluation. There are no restrictions as to race, religion or sex.

A diagnostic evaluation determines the client's skills to which his work program is geared. Work experience and vocational training are obtained through services requested by area businesses and industry.

As stated in New Horizons annual report, "Clients get satisfaction from knowing they are performing useful work. And a smile comes a little easier when you know your employment is meaningful."

# How Do Schools Handle Juvenile Drug Abuse?

FARMINGTON What's being done about drug abuse in the Farmington School District?

Farmington School District administrators are allying with police, parents, social workers, and the courts in an attempt to stem drug usage among teenagers.

"We can't permit the schools to become an arena for drug traffic," says Lewis Schulman, secondary education assistant superintendent.

He explained that when youngsters are found with drugs, a fact which must be demonstrated and proved, the police are called and the offender is turned over to the parents' custody.

Also utilized are school social workers, the Oakland County Probate Court youth assistance bureau, and the Farmington Area Advisory Council's Rap Line.

"Some steps have to be taken before a child is admitted back into school. It is important that help be gotten for them," says Schulman.

To assist principals and teachers with drug related incidents among students, the administration has adopted the drug education guidelines recommended by the Michigan State Board of Education.

A recent phenomenon among drug users is methaqualone, which, police say, has gained increased popularity among young people. Methaqualone is a sleeping drug used in deepening pills.

"I'm not so sure there is an increase in drug usage. The problem is with the increased popularity of methaqualone among youths. But I don't think there is an increase over last year," says Capt. Daniel Burns, City of Farmington police.

Twenty per cent of last year's juvenile arrests in the city were drug related. Last year say 54 youths arrested for drug violations. This is contrasted to 21 in 1971. Eleven per cent of the narcotic arrests (about five) were distributed among juveniles 13 to 15 years old.

Last week Farmington Township police picked up 14 juveniles, ages 13 to 14, for sale and use of drugs in a series of arrests.

Burns says the police are in constant contact with the schools in relationship to drugs.

"We have a good working relationship with the schools. We encourage them to get in touch with us if they have any problems and to go through the parents if help."

Farmington Township police have recently met with school principals and teachers to advise them of procedures to use in drug related incidents. Teachers are especially interested in defining their lines of authority, according to a police spokesman.

Also aiding the school district is Rap Line. The agency has recently produced a movie to show various groups around Farmington to aid in understanding drug problems.

Rap Line officials say they have noted an increase in calls to the crisis center from youngsters of junior high age. One official noted a seeming first hand knowledge of methaqualone among a group of seventh graders he recently addressed.

A seven-month survey by the center showed that 85 per cent of the calls relating to depressants were methaqualone connected.

Rap Line officials also have met with teachers to aid in understanding the drug problem.
