GIVES RECITAL

Albert Bolitho, organist of the Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church of Farmington, will present a recital Monday, May 22. The 2:30 p.m. recital to be held at the Metropolitan Methodist Church in Detroit, will climax four years of study at Wayne University for Mr. Bolitho. It is a requirement for the degree of Bachelor of Music.

Mr. Bolitho, a 1946 graduate of Clarenceville High School and an eight-year resident of Farmington, will have the distinction of being the first person to graduate from Wayne with a Bachelor of Music degree with a major in organ.

The recital, sponsored by Wayne University, will consist of a Choral prelude: Toccata, Adagio and Fugue in C Major by Bach; Fifth Symphony for organ by C. M. Wilder; Piece Heroique by C. Franck; Starlight, by Karg-Elert, and Pageant, by Sowerby. No admission to the recital is charged.

Poorest Pheasant Area Shows Best Recovery

While all sections of Michigan's pheasant range showed dead-in-the-field improvement, the poorest ringneck area provided the best rate of recovery, further conservation department tabulation of hunter report cards show.

Size of most improvement were Berrien, Cass, St. Joseph, Branch, Van Buren, Kalamazoo, Calhoun and Barry counties — where the kill was up 89 per cent over 1948.

The Thumb, high population area several years ago, continues to recover at a comparatively slower pace. Thumb area counties Tuscola, Huron, Saginaw, Bay and Sanilac — experienced a 25 per cent increase.

Hunters shot at least 40 per cent more cocks in Allegan and Ottawa counties, a small sector of good production. Muskegon was the only county in the state pheasant range showing a decreased kill.

Average to better pheasant areas in central and southeastern Michigan showed 1949 bag increases ranging from 39 to 40 per cent. This includes a section of the state running from Port Huron and south to the Ohio border. Best producing strip in the state now spreads south from Macomb to Lenawee county.

Eight counties had a harvest of over 29,000 birds. These are by rank: Wayne, Genesee, Ottawa, Saginaw, Tuscola, Monroe, Muskegon and Ingham.

Game men report Michigan has recovered faster than any other state east of the Rockies and believe 1950 hunting prospects should be about the best since the 1944 peak year when 1,400,000 pheasants were taken.

Conservation department previously reported that 853,500 cocks were shot by 377,375 hunters last fall. Computations are based on a 3.5 per cent hunter report card return.

12 German Officers Enter MSC Institute

Twelve high-ranking German police officers are well into a four-month study of American police techniques and court procedures at Michigan State College, financed by U. S. Department of State.

Following a month in classrooms, the officers will move into study tours of outstanding police organizations of the nation, according to Arthur F. Brandstatter, head of the MSC department of police administration.

They will study each phase of U. S. courts — federal, state and municipal — and fit the philosophy and pattern of American crime detection and prevention over a German system left battered by World War II.

The officers are key men, screened and tested from a small nucleus of trained policemen.
