is being forced to take over a ramshackle navy hospital for neuro-psychiatric patients. The mental ward is an old hotel, with corridors and doors too narrow for hospital use.

More important, this hospital cannot accommodate staffed with doctors and technicians to handle its 1,000 beds. The V. A. wants to build a new psychiatric hospital in Atlanta, Ga., where doctors from Emory University School of Medicine medical school, would be available for residence work. Such a hospital could maintain the navy "snakepit" at Augusta for 10 years. However, the budget bureau says no.

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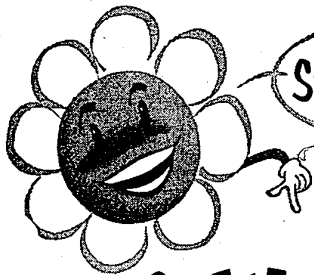
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
