Trappers End Season
With 6,726 Beaver
In spite of miserable operating conditions, the conservation department reports upper peninsula trappers ended the spring season with a bag of 6,726 beaver and 203 otter. 32-1c

Combined with the reduced take in the lower peninsula, the 1950 season produced 8,053 beaver and a 27th otter. Department issued 3,353 1/2 permits in the upper peninsula and 1,337 in the lower peninsula. Lower peninsula season closed March 31. 32-1c

"Rough" Fish Here To Stay
Prejudice and habit notwithstanding, so-called rough fish are here to stay in Michigan waters, says Fred A. Westerman, conservation department fisheries chief.
"Spring smelt runs are under way and suckers and carp will be on the move, yet too few persons appreciate that these and other less popular species represent millions of pounds of high protein food," Westerman continues.
"Smelt dipping is becoming a more popular sport, however many of the silvery titbits actually taken are wasted. Great Lakes commercial fishermen take several million pounds of smelt, herring, sauger and carp, but certainly would not more if prejudice could be broken down, opening up a larger market. While most of these less popular species are used for human consumption, larger quantities also are utilized in animal feeding, with meager returns to fishermen."
"Unfortunately many anglers would welcome the removal of rough fish from all sport fishing waters. Such a project, even assuming it was judged biologically worth while and could actually be accomplished, would be too large and expensive an undertaking."
Westerman calls attention to the fact that carp originally were brought over from Europe for the specific purpose of adding a food fish species to our waters. Today Westerman notes in contrast, when the angler comes up with a carp on his line he is quite likely to mutter a few choice words about wasting his time.
Less desirable species eat certain available foods which game fish generally ignore and cannot readily utilize. Highly important is the fact that they can convert their foods into fish flesh at a faster rate than many game fish.
Westerman allows that some of these fish are not pleasant in appearance in the rough. Improved methods of catching being worked out will promote their more ready acceptance over the fish counter.
Even those taken by the sport fisherman might be better utilized if he knew better methods of cutting, cleaning and preparing as a food fish. To this end, Westerman notes, new recipes have been worked out and tested at Michigan State College experiment station. Roe and fetters can be secured from the conservation department.
Even though affairs is a gold plated crop, it needs fertilization to supply some of its wants, say Michigan State College agricultural specialists. So long as a stand of alfalfa remains good and you wish to continue it for hay, it should be top-dressed at least every second year.

TREE-GROWTH HAS BEEN SPEEDED UP, U-M ALUMNUS SAYS
Faster growing trees are being produced for timber use by applying the principles of genetics to forest crops.
Certain trees grow to maturity in one-third less time, while other trees have been developed that resist destructive plant diseases, a University of Michigan alumnus told forestry and botany classes at the University.
By crossing Western and Eastern white pine a hybrid type of pine tree has been produced that is ready for timbering in one-third less time than both of the parent trees, retired field station superintendent of the Institute of Forest Genetics, United States Forest Service in Charlotte.
This hybrid will also resist "blister rust," a highly destructive plant disease. "Blister rust" is very common in white pines throughout the country. Weidman pointed out that white pine produces the most valuable type of lumber of all the coniferous trees. Test plantings of the hybrid have been made recently in Oregon and Wisconsin. Experiments at the Institute Station at Placerville, California, have been restricted to species of pine trees because a species of pine tree, called the highly prized softwood lumber than any other species, Weidman said.
The Institute's work is also reflected by its greatly limited funds. "In light of the tremendous demand for housing and the ever increasing demand for wood, it is unfortunate that more adequate financial support has not been voted by Congress," he said.
Resistance to a weevil insect pest has been developed in another hybrid pine, Weidman reported. The weevil has done much damage to forest plantations in Northern California. Crossing Cutler pine and Jeffrey pine has produced the resistant hybrid.
"The tremendous increase in corn production since the introduction of hybrid types is an indication of what can happen when the principles of genetics are applied to all forest crops," Weidman said. "The Institute has only started to tap the possibilities that lie in this field. There are just eight people on the staff and they are experimenting with pine trees alone. It is the only agency doing this type of work and its scope is nationwide."

TRELLIS HUNTERS TO VISIT FARMERS DURING SUMMER
A word of advice to sportsmen was given recently by Charles Shick, extension specialist in game management for Michigan State College and the Conservation Department. He says hunters should take time to get acquainted with farmers.
Shick maintains that the farmer likes to know the people who hunt on his land. One of his chief complaints is that hunters fail to visit with him after the brief open season on farm game. Sometimes he feels like a forgotten man since he gets attention only in the fall of the year.
The game management specialist says that a friendly visit at various times during the year creates a better farmer-hunter relationship.
