at the expense of other phases of the program.

**DISCUSS NEW SITE**

President Gerald Domes asked the board to answer an objection to the proposed site that he had been asked: "How do we consider the Cut-Off place more accessible?"

At the present one-way traffic on the Cut-Off would be easier to control, and would permit quicker and safer entry and exit by visiting spectators. He also stated that contacts with State Police had approved the site for easy traffic control.

When Domes asked how close to Hill Road the site would be, Hill had no answer. He stated that the examinations he had made of the field would indicate the best location would be along Nine Mile Road, and that the board had its choice of almost any place on the property.

Domes' next question was "Why only a ten-year lease?" Hill answered that question by stating the city commission had an investment of tax money in the property and would not like to "give away" the land. However, Hill reminded the board that the city's proposed lease would give option to purchase at any time and option to renew the \$30,000 cost of Kenner Harbor's field to the expense to be met by Farmington. "They had to pay \$8800 for land," he said, "and \$5200 for pulling out stumps and filling it. Here, our grading costs would only be about \$1200."

Domes then said the margin in the last election was too small, and the fact that the election brought out more voters than usually come to a single feature school election indicated the advisability of re-submitting the question. He said, "It's good to know some folks are interested."

When the president said, in reference to his questions, "It's no issue; just a matter only of clarification. Let's put it on the ballot." Domes voted "Yes" to the motion made by Hill that the issue be re-submitted.

Domes explained the reversal of his previous vote by saying he had wanted the measure on the general election from the first, but the board wanted the decision earlier to give time for preparing the field for use this fall. He admitted that the voters should have an alternate, although there is none on the field proposal.

**To the Editor:**

Last Friday the School Board voted to put the question of the Heights and Hill Road, on the June 12 general election ballot.

Realizing that not too many people are familiar with the location and qualities of the new field, I would like to try to make these clear to them.

The field is in an excellent location, having access from both the Cut-Off and Hill Road. The soil is another great asset because it is a composition of sand and loam which makes exceptionally good drainage.

For example, if it would rain on the field in the morning, by afternoon the field would be dry enough to play on. When it rains on the present athletic field, it becomes so muddy that a game cannot be played there for two or three days, and even then it is still so slippery that the safety of every person on that field is hampered.

Many people think that the present field would be perfect to light because it is a natural amphitheater. The cost of making the field into a stadium would be so very unreasonable that it wouldn't be worth the money. Besides, there is not space for proper parking facilities and cars parked along the sides of the road would cause a traffic hazard.

Even if there were not the last two reasons to contend with, the fog down on the field would make it impossible for a game to be seen.

With these arguments in mind, I hope that everyone will vote "Yes" on the lighted athletic field June 12.

**Loss Of Ducks On Detroit River Stops**

Loss of ducks on the Detroit River has subsided. Ever since before conservation department waterfowl workers were able to recover nearly 1,000 carcasses.

Losses still then evident in early March — topping the last year's minor losses but not matching those in the 1948 winter.

Information and evidence uncovered by department waterfowl specialists has been turned over to the state water resources commission.

Pollution, including oil and other industrial wastes, appear to be major factors in waterfowl deaths. So many dead ducks were picked up by workers to discount this theory. Weight loss of a number of trapped scaups averaged four ounces.
