

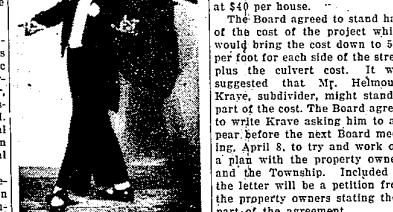
RESIDENTS JAM BOARD MEETING TO SEEK ROAD ACTION

Township Agrees To Share Cost Of Road Repair In Roland Gardens

Property owner of the Tarabus Roland Gardens Subdivision jammed and overtook the Township office Tuesday night seeking action from the Board on repair and rebuilding of the section. The group stated that action must be taken at once to eliminate the break-up of subdivision roads every spring. They stated that new residents of the subdivision must park on Farmington Road because they can not get through the streets. The subdivision is located on the east side of Farmington Road between Eight and Nine Mile Roads.

Mrs. Norman Stainbrook, co-sponsor for the property owners, asked what the Township Board would do to take care of the road situation. Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated that a survey had been made of the subdivision roads in the last few days and an estimate of cost had been secured. He continued that the estimate was \$1.10 per foot for each side of a 16-foot road which would bring the streets' up to county specifications. In addition to this would be the cost of the culvert, which was estimated at \$40 per foot.

The Board approved the resolution at a special meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the Clarenceville High School. The resolution was approved following notification by the Wayne County Health Department that some type of sewage disposal would be necessary before the school could be used.

A near record number of Clarenceville students and adults participated in the Livonia Blood Type program which ended last Friday, Dallas F. Hay, Clinic Director, announced this week.

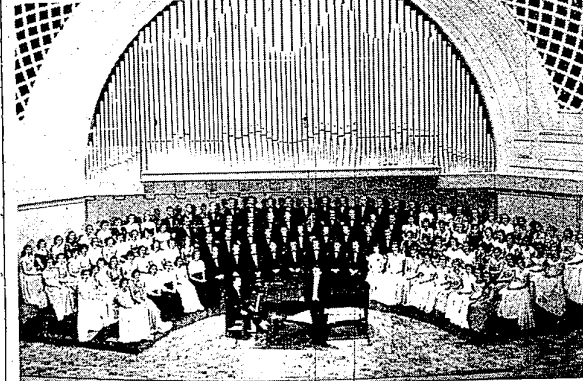

City Uses New Street Patch Mixture Over 150 Register To Date For Local Blood Bank Visit

Work has begun on the patching and repair of streets in the City of Farmington, James Tennant, City Manager, announced this week.

The work is being started earlier this year in an effort to keep all of the streets usable during the spring season. Tennant added, "It is possible through a new patching mixture being used for the first time by the city. The new patch can be applied under either wet or dry conditions on roads that already have a concrete or bituminous surface."

Tennant and Floyd Sallow, public works foreman, visited Mason, Mich. last week to see a demonstration of the new material. The City Manager added that the cold pack can be applied under water as effectively as on a dry surface and it adheres perfectly to the old patch. A total of six tons of the patch has been purchased by the city.

New Process Enables City To Start Program Well In Advance Of Previous Years

The new patch material will enable the city to begin repair work far earlier than ever before. Tennant added that it should put the streets in good shape through the spring season and form a smooth base for a seal coat which will be applied during the summer.
