Alaska but under 5,000 feet radar won't work. That's where the ground observers come in.

Spotters won't have to learn laboriously to recognize all types of aircraft, says Matland. All they have to do is report. Civil Aeronautics and Air Force liaison will start interceptor pilots scrambling if the planes are unauthorised.

"There are fighter units (I can't tell you where, but in Michigan) which can take off in five minutes. Each minute saved means six air miles gained. An alert ground observer could save Detroit," the general points out.
