Another gift of \$10,000 was sent to Our Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, to help provide aid for the war-stricken people of Korea and Europe.

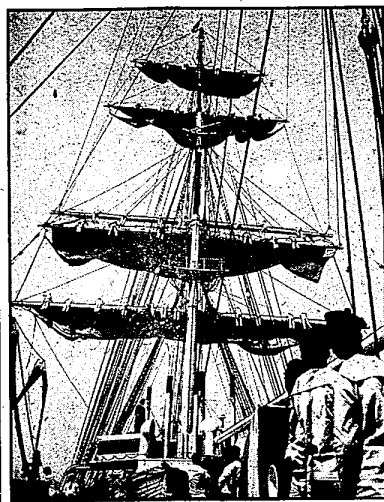

Liberal Deer Season Termed Necessary

What Michigan hunters look on as the most liberal deer regulations granted since 1941 are in effect a biological necessity for preservation of the herd. The conservation department has stamped its approval on the 15-day buck season, November 15 to 30, with the final three days in the northern lower peninsula open for the taking of any deer — bucks, does or fawns. A hunting group of four or more also may take one buck for camp purposes. That "one two" hunters may take any deer during those final days will mean less starvation and a more healthy herd in deer yards.

Expect Oak Wilt Damage Estimate In August Aerial and ground surveys of damage done state woodlands by deadly oak wilt fungus are being completed by conservation department foresters this month. Totalled results are expected some time in August.

Surveys are being made over the southernmost four banks of counties. Last year, only the lower two rows of counties were surveyed. This year, aerial surveys were flown over the two rows of counties adjacent to the lower banks flown last year, while ground checks were made of areas where the fungus was found last year. At present, ground checks are being made by air are being made.

Though apparently not widespread in Michigan, oak wilt is causing considerable damage in midwestern states south and west of Michigan.

Particularly troublesome in red oaks, the fungus hits the entire crown and can kill a large tree.
