U-M Registration Set For Sept. 17

New buildings, new curriculums and one new dean will help to highlight the ever-changing scene on the University of Michigan campus when the summer of registration on Monday, September 22, at Ann Arbor.

As usual there will be a week-long orientation program before the opening of classes so that entering freshmen and transfer students can get fully acquainted with the University. Registration starts September 17.

University officials have been anxiously accurate in the past in estimating enrollment but world unrest and military needs are now making it more difficult.

President Franklin Hatcher, who will be finishing his second year as head of the University, and his administrative officers prepared an operating budget for the coming year which shows the expectation of enrolling 35,000 students. This figure will have to stand until the registration count can be completed. One year ago there were 37,213 students taking resident credit courses.

Two new buildings, both constructed from funds provided by the Legislature, will be ready to occupy this fall. A three-story building to Angell Hall, costing \$4,784,403, will provide modern and much-needed additional space for the College of Literature, Science and the Arts.

One of the units contains 47 new classrooms, department quarters for journalism, a vision laboratory and a psychology workshop and laboratory. In a second unit will be office space for 195 faculty members as well as departmental quarters for English, history, political science, psychology and sociology. Connecting the two units will be a story-and-half unit housing four lecture rooms.

The other new structure is a \$3,726,800 Out-Patient Clinic at University Hospital. This provides modern and expanded facilities for handling patients who receive treatment but do not require hospitalization. This unit also is an important step towards a centralized medical center and will help the Medical School provide the necessary training for its increased enrollment. The freshman class was stepped up from 150 to 200 students last fall and this increase carried over into the sophomore class and reported at the freshman level will require the Medical School to provide training for 100 more students than it has had to train prior to 1951.

Field and tree-ripened fruits have the richest color and flavor for frozen storage. The fruit should be firm-ripe and freshly picked. In sorting and washing the fruit, take care to prevent bruising. Drain well after washing and pack in suitable plastic containers, dry or with sugar or sirup, depending upon the fruit. Sugar and sirup help preserve color and flavor, as well as prolong the storage time of the fruit.

In general, freeze only the best - firm, well-ripened fruits and fresh, tender vegetables. Meats must be high in quality and handled properly from the time of slaughtering to freezing. Dry meat should be frozen.

ABOUT 15,000 IN AREA TO GET SOCIAL SECURITY BOOST

About 15,000 people in the Oakland-Jackson County area will receive higher social security payments early in October as a result of the social security amendments which recently became effective.

Ray A. C. Atwood, manager of the Pontiac social security office, emphasized that no one needs to apply for the increased payments. "If you are already receiving a benefit, it is already changing the amounts," he pointed out. "We expect to get them changed in time to have them in the mail date, but in a few cases we don't meet that schedule we'll send the regular check and make up the difference on the next check."

Atwood pointed out that although nearly every family receiving payments would receive an increase, the additional amount would not always be divided equally among the members of the family receiving monthly checks. In some cases the entire increase will go to the retired worker.

Under the terms of the law, most families will get an increase of about \$5; some will get less, some will get more. A few beneficiaries now being paid, all most of those payable in the future, will be based on earnings after 1950. Instead of after 1936. The amended law provides a new formula for determining the amount of the payments in these cases. Under the new formula, a worker's benefit would be 55% of the first \$100 of his average monthly earnings plus 15% of the remainder up to \$600.

Beginning September 1, the new law increased to \$75 a month instead of \$50 the amount of money a beneficiary may earn and still receive the monthly benefits.

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
