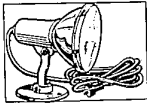

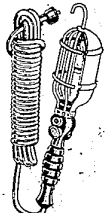

OWEN J. (PAT) CLEARY

Owen J. (Pat) Cleary, of Ypsilanti, President of Cleary College and an attorney, is the Republican nominee for Michigan Secretary of State.

As a member of the State Administrative Board — the state "cabinet" which determines administrative and financial policies — Cleary has pledged to give the people of Michigan the "stern and consistent attitude toward government which they deserve and need."

Cleary was an Army officer in World War I, and later served the Michigan National Guard. Before the outbreak of World War II, he helped organize the Michigan State troops, serving in various staff positions. He became commander with the rank of Brigadier General in 1946. He was also Chief Air Raid Warden for the Michigan Office of Civilian Defense from 1942 to 1945, and for the past eight years has served as State Chairman for the National Defense Commission.

From 1917 through 1949, Cleary was Chairman of the State Liquor Control Commission.

He was graduated from the University of Michigan and earned his law degree at the University of Detroit. Cleary is a past president member of the American and State Bar Associations, and the National and Michigan Education associations.



D. HALE BRAKE

D. Hale Brake has earned the confidence of citizens throughout Michigan during his ten years as State Treasurer in 1942, providing him with a wide range of experience in both the legislative and executive branches of government.

As Chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission, he has acquired a thorough knowledge of the financial problems facing local units of government and their relation to the state.

Brake was born in Kent County in 1891. He was graduated from Albion College in 1915 and became a teacher. After three years as a high school principal, Brake decided to study law. He received his law degree from the University of Michigan and was admitted to the bar in 1922, entering practice in Grand Rapids. Since 1933 he has maintained a law office in Stanton, serving as prosecuting attorney of Montcalm County from 1927 to 1930.



ROBERT S. McALLISTER

Robert S. McAllister, 54, the Democratic candidate for Secretary of State, was born and raised in Grand Rapids, where he now practices law with the firm of McAllister and McAllister.

McAllister was graduated from the University of Michigan and received his law degree from Northwestern University. At the latter school, he was a fellow classmate of Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic candidate for President.

He is a brother of Federal Judge Thomas F. McAllister, and his father, James T. McAllister,

was prominent in Kent County Democratic party work for many years. McAllister has been Public Administrator for Kent County in 1932-34, and has served as delegate to county and state Democratic conventions.



WILLIAM L. JOHNSON

William L. Johnson, 51, of Ironwood, the Democratic candidate for State Treasurer, is president of the general manager of the Upper Michigan - Wisconsin Broadcasting Company.

Public service and government work has long engaged Johnson's attention. He was City Manager and manager of the Ironwood Chamber of Commerce from 1947 to the present time. He is also a member of the executive committee of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau.

Johnson served as field representative of the Federal Housing Administration, 1935-37; Branch Manager, Michigan Liquor Control Commission 1937-39; and District Supervisor, United States Census, 1930.

Johnson, the only Upper Peninsula candidate for a state executive office on the November ballot, has been active in Democratic party work for many years. In 1922, he was president of the Roosevelt Garner Club in his area, and has served as Democratic chairman of the 12th Congressional District and as Democratic chairman of the Gogebic County Democratic organization.

Johnson served with the U. S. Army Engineers in 1920-21.
