Last Tuesday we had our meeting to discuss the matter of paved streets. For those of you who were not there I want to tell you what happened, and for those of you who were there I want to sum up the results of the meeting.

First, however, I'd like to thank those of you who attended for showing the interest you had in the matter. Also, I think we owe thanks to James Tennant for giving us a lot of valuable information on the subjects discussed (and cussed).

For a long time we of the Civic Association had been asked by a lot of people to look into the various aspects of having the streets paved. We did this, as thoroughly as we could, and advised you of a lot of the details in the "brochure" we passed out last spring. Then

we called this meeting in order to get a majority of opinion from the people who would have to pay for any improvement which might be made. It was a meeting intended for general discussion purposes—and that's what was done. We had to know whether a majority of you wanted the improvement or not. Apparently most of you do not want paving or you do not feel that you want to (or are able to) pay the cost of it.

From the discussion we gathered that there were five different groups of specific opinions, and they were as follows: (1) Storm sewers only. (2) Curb, gutters and storm sewers only. (3) Curb, gutters, sewers and paving. (4) Combination storm and sanitary sewers only. (5) No curbs, gutters, storm sewers, sanitary sewers or paving—just leave things as they are except for whatever improvement the city can make with your tax money.

Opinions number 1, 2, 3 and 5 were just about evenly divided and in no instance was the vote strong enough to indicate a majority. However, number 4, the combination storm sewer and sanitary sewer, seemed to be primarily interested in knowing whether or not we should circulate a petition for an improvement, and if so, for what kind of a street improvement. We wanted to know how far you wanted to go on this matter, and how much you wanted to spend for improvement, if anything at all. Well—now we know pretty conclusively.

You do not want to go to the expense of paving the streets. A good number of you are interested in the possibility of a combination sewer (perhaps a majority, perhaps not).

So we are going to look into the cost and other pertinent details of such a project, and we will present to you, on paper, what ever information we are able to obtain. After this is done we will canvass the subdivision and get a positive opinion as to what the majority think on this matter. If it appears the majority want such an improvement, we will have petitions prepared and circulate them for everyone's consideration and signing.

Before I close this column for this week I'd like to express the thanks of all concerned for the contributions made to the Farmington Blood Bank on Monday and Tuesday. You've helped yourself, your community, and your country—even though it is your duty, you can be proud.

### POLICE CHIEF WARNS HUNTERS OF REGULATIONS

George Harmon, police chief of Livonia, asks that hunters be cognizant of the rules and regulations regarding hunting in the City of Livonia.

Said Harmon: "An amendment has been made to the hunting ordinance banning hunting of any kind in all but 12 sections of Livonia. Hunting is prohibited in any area South of Schoolcraft Road, or east of Farmington Road. Only in the 12 sections north of Schoolcraft and west of Farmington Roads will hunting be permitted.

Even in the area where hunting is allowed, only shotguns will be permitted. No hunting is to be done within 500 feet of a building except by farmers in their own land and near their own buildings. An exception to the ordinance was made for licensed shooting ranges.

The amendment allows hunting in this section of the city to specified property owners. The owner of five acres or more of land that

lies in the agricultural (AG) zone may make a written application to the Chief of Police for a temporary permit. Under the amendment only landowners and members of the immediate family who reside on the property would be allowed hunting privileges. The law against using or discharging a gun within 600 feet of any building and the ban on Sunday hunting are not affected by this amendment."

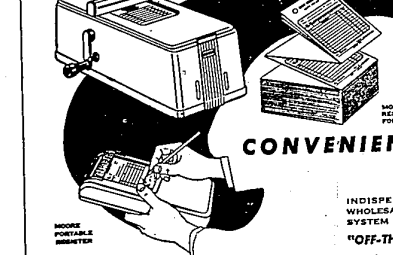
