A tabulation of recent reports from conservation department field men bears out earlier reports that waterfowl hunters can expect more ducks this year than during previous average seasons.

Favorable weather conditions helped produce a successful hatch, the reports show, and only fall concentrations of birds in some areas are above normal.

More important, bird numbers over the state are, in general, above normal.
