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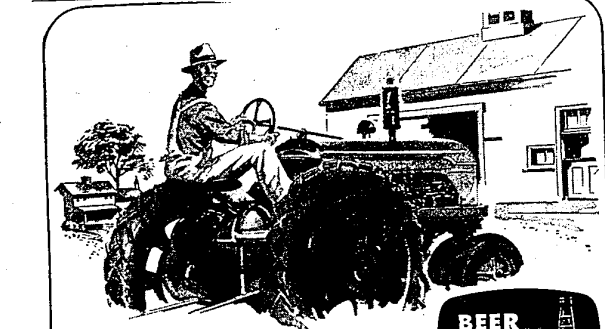

The Freshmen held a dance entitled "Wigwam Whirl" October 8. The dance consisted of modern and square dancing with a grand march added.


An Indian head was placed in the center of the stage. Around the gym yellow, orange and green streamers were hung.
