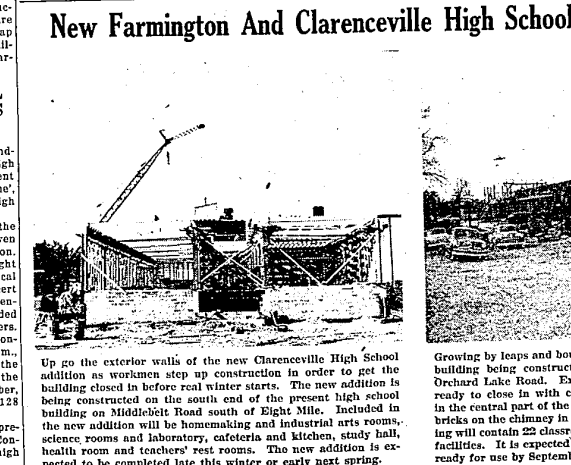
Farmington's 1952 United Fund and Community Chest Drive will officially begin this Friday, November 14, Vern Willard, chairman, announced Monday morning.

Farmington Board Considers School Appraisal Plan

At its regular meeting Monday the Farmington Township School Board decided to study further the possibility of contracting the Lloyd - Thomas Company, Appraisal Engineers, to appraise the Farmington Township Schools.

Mr. Leo Reihmer, a representative of the appraisal company, presented the facts and figures to the Board and according to his calculations it would cost the District approximately \$450 to have all of the school buildings, with the exception of the new schools and new school additions, appraised.

According to Superintendent of Schools E. Dunkelke, the reason for the appraisal is not that the school buildings are under-insured, but that some are over-insured and others are not insured.

The Board voted to continue its contract with the Fuel Oil Corporation of Detroit for the school heating supply of fuel oil.

Superintendent Dunkelke named the several structural changes in the present high school building that would be desirable in the interest of expanded administrative facilities.
