There can be no going back to so-called "democracy." The party can only go on relentlessly to communism. . . . There is not likely to be in Great Britain the bloodshed through which the Bolsheviks wedged to power in Russia, but a haunting fear has arisen that Mr. Atlee may be playing the part of Kerensky to some more ruthless figure willing to seize the scepter from him.
 Thomas published these appraisals in 1951. Since then the British Labour-Socialist Party has been split down the middle. Anquin Hixon, who seems to glorify Soviet Communism and vilify America, has risen to contest Atlee for power. And Atlee himself now is an advocate of "getting along" with Soviet Communism. History shows that a nation "gets along" with Soviet Communism like a fresh codfish gets along in the paws of a hungry polar bear!
