

Carillon Recitals To Begin At Cranbrook May 1

The annual spring series of carillon recitals at Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, will begin Sunday, May 1, at 4 p.m. Music Director Dr. Maurice Garbrant has announced.

Largest in the Detroit area, the Christ Church carillon has 62 bells covering four complete chromatic octaves. It was dedicated in 1928 by Anton Breus, bellmaster of the Dock Singing Tower in Florida.

Guest carilloneur Fred Marriott, organist at Kirk-in-the-Hills, Bloomfield Hills, will play on May 15. He was previously connected with the Rockefeller Memorial Chapel in New York.

 a hazard to health and safety of the area. The Board stated that condemnation of the property as a health menace was up to Dr. Gadwah, Health Officer. Dr. Gadwah stated that, under the ordinance, the entire burden was left to the Health Officer instead of being shared by the Board of Health, which is the Township Board. He added that the Board should take some responsibility in these matters. A. G. Leonard, Township Attorney, stated that the ordinance, which was drawn according to State Law, requires that the Health Officer take the action. He pledged the support of his office to aid the health officer should legal action be necessary. Dr. Gadwah stated that, in his opinion, devoting sufficient time and effort to these immediate problems, particularly in connection with the water situation, he added that the lack of water in sections of the township is so serious and that more pressure should be exerted to get some action. Blanchard took exception to Dr. Gadwah's remarks, stating that surveys have been made and that the matter is in the hands of the bonding company. He stated that this was a highly technical subject and can't be pushed too much. Dr. Gadwah added that a selling job has to be done and "we can't take a negative attitude and expect to accomplish the objective."

 able to stand and walk to the ambulance. Ralph Banfield, 34219 Grand River, reported that the car caught on fire immediately following the accident, but that a passing truck driver put it out with a hand extinguisher. The driver, a 1953 Chevrolet, was completely wrapped around the tree. The front grill was sheared off and the motor was torn loose from its mountings. Wallace, who was alone in the car, was taken to Redford Receiving Hospital by the Thayer Ambulance.

Four other persons were injured in two separate auto accidents last week.

Last Wednesday, shortly before 8 a.m., Mrs. Amos H. Butler, 30691 Grand River, suffered head and shoulder injuries and Mrs. Rose Kaake of Redford received injuries to the head and knee in a two-car crash on U. S. 16 at Tark Road. Both were taken to Redford Receiving Hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Kaake, traveling alone, smashed into the rear of an automobile driven by Amos Butler while it was stopped on Grand River waiting to make a left turn. Both vehicles were headed west.

Mr. Butler is a school principal in the Farmington School system. Bert W. Hullett of Walled Lake and Loren Hames of Keego Harbor suffered minor injuries Thursday afternoon, April 22, when the car in which they were riding went out of control on Twelve Mile Road just west of Halsted.

Hullett suffered cuts about the head and Hames received cuts on the hand and a smashed finger. Injuries were not serious and only first aid treatment was necessary in both cases.

According to a police report on the accident, the driver lost control of the auto due to the breaking of a rear spring.

City Plans Action On Zoning Issues

Final action on four proposed amendments to the City Zoning Ordinance is expected to be taken by the Council at its regular meeting on Monday, May 16.

Two public hearings were held in connection with the proposed amendments. One hearing was held on Saturday morning with approximately 25 property owners in attendance. Because a quorum of the Council members was not present, the hearing was rescheduled for Wednesday evening. Officials stated that the Saturday morning hearing was so that the new members had already made commitments on that date.

Members of the Council stated that the comments and objections noted at the public hearings would be weighed prior to the final decision. The first proposal concerns the rezoning of the property east of Farmington Road between the Cut-Off and Nine Mile from Suburban to Light Industrial. The second proposed amendment involves the property on the west side of Farmington Road, and bounded by the Cut-Off, Nine Mile and Gill Road which would be rezoned from Suburban to General Industrial. A third proposal concerns the rezoning of the former Our Lady of Sorrows School property from residential to commercial for a distance of 400 feet north of Grand River. The final proposal involves the rezoning from residential to commercial of a parcel of land at the corner of Farmington Road and Stockin as well as a parcel 130 feet north of Stockin in rear of the lots facing on the south side of Grand River.

Municipal League To Meet May 5

Municipal bonding and state legislation affecting municipalities will be the main topics of discussion at the 1955 Regional Meeting of Region IV of the Michigan Municipal League. The meeting, arranged for all city and village officials in the region, will be held at the New City Hall, Pontiac, the afternoon and evening of Thursday, May 5.

Region IV comprises the counties of Genesee, Macomb and Oakland.

Beginning the second year of regional organization of the League, city and village officials present will select a regional chairman, regional vice-chairman, and regional secretary. The officers will be primarily responsible for the coordination of League activities within the region during 1955-56.

J. Dean Stanley, former consultant to the Municipal Finance Commission, will be on hand at the meeting, and will discuss municipal bonding during the early part of the afternoon session. Important state legislation will be among other subjects of current interest to be discussed during the meeting.

The Michigan Municipal League is a cooperative organization of the cities and villages of the state. It is devoted to the preservation and advancement of municipal home rule and the improvement of municipal government in Michigan. Regional meetings are held each year in ten regions throughout the state. The meetings provide officials of neighboring municipalities an opportunity to discuss similar problems and become better acquainted.
