RED CROSS ANNOUNCES NEW POLICY CHANGE IN FUND RAISING PROGRAM

Harold B. Euler, chairman of Oakland County Chapter of American Red Cross, announces that the recent change in fund raising policy adopted by American National Red Cross will not constitute a major alteration for the local chapter.

Mr. Euler says that he is pleased that the new policy announced recently by E. Roland Harriman, national chairman, has "the best interests of the community as a whole" in its plan.

The new policy gives local chapters greater flexibility in determining how they will campaign for members and funds.

With the changes, chapters will be able to plan, in a more direct and helpful manner, with other agencies and community leaders in matters of united or federated fund raising.

Chapters will follow these provisions: They shall retain the determination and control of the Red Cross budget and goal at all times, and they shall retain the right to conduct a roll call for members and funds and Junior members.

Last Meeting of High School P.T.A. For This Year Held Tuesday, April 19

The final meeting of the Farmington High School Parent-Teacher Association for this year was held Tuesday, April 19, in the school gymnasium. A sizeable number attended.

President Ivan Clarke expressed his appreciation for the displays from the social studies and mathematics departments and thanked the teachers, P. T. A. Board members and committees for the past year. Following remarks, Vernon P. Fisher installed the new P. T. A. board for next year.

In a talk before the group, G. V. Harrison, high school principal, stressed several of the crucial periods in a student's life and pointed out that the transition from grammar school to junior high school, and from junior to senior high, are very important. "There will be an orientation program for students moving into senior high on May 13 and we will meet with parents of junior high students to discuss high school programs and study plans on April 27," Harrison said.

Mrs. Lillian Monash of the Michigan Employment Security Commission emphasized the importance of a young man or woman just out of school in seeking employment in a field for which she is fitted. "Money should not be the only consideration," stated Mrs. Monash. "There are other compensations, some more important than money, to be considered. Young folks looking for jobs should be able to read, write and spell well enough to fill in an application; be confident, and should realize that they have to take the drudgery along with the glamour and that they have to learn to get along with their fellow workers."

Dr. Roebor, a guest at the meeting, explained his work at the Counseling Laboratory, a part of the School of Education, at the University of Michigan. He pointed out that his department should in no way be interpreted as a recruiting service for the university. He stated that the department was interested in helping young folks with study or employment problems regardless of whether or not they plan to go to college.

Mrs. Bob Gray reported on a meeting recently held in the National Guard Armory on Civil Defense. "It behooves us all to learn what we can about civil defense so that we will know what to do in case we are subjected to bomb warfare," said Mrs. Gray. "There will be no spectators at any of these groups. Those beyond help, those needing help, and those who can help."
