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HUNTERS URGED TO BE COURTEOUS ON FARM LAND

Michigan's 1955 Game Law Digest again will urge sportsmen to observe the Golden Rule when hunting on farm land this year. In the past, some hunters have not been notable for their courtesy to farmers during game seasons. To blot out some of these problems, sportsmen's groups have been urging closer cooperation. Last year, the official Digest added weight to the campaign. "To hunt on another man's land is a privilege," said the Digest cover. "and abuse of that privilege has but one result — loss of a place to hunt."

Commissioner Frank E. Burch of Detroit said at a recent meeting that last year's campaign was well received and appeared to pay dividends. The Commission moved to reserve the Digest cover for the same purpose this year. It will be printed in a few months.

DODGE TELECAST OF GOLF TOURNAMENT SET FOR JUNE 18

Gene Sarazen, colorful veteran professional golfer, will serve as commentator for the finals of the 55th National Open Golf Tournament to be telecast nationally this year under the sponsorship of Dodge Division, Chrysler Corporation.

Time and place of the telecast is set for 8 to 9 p.m. (EST) Saturday, June 18, at San Francisco's scenic Olympic Country Club. Sarazen, for more than 35 years one of the game's most colorful figures, will be co-host of the program, with Lindsey Nelson, NBC sports announcer, both to provide color commentary and general information on "live" coverage of the final rounds.

Dodge's sponsorship of the event will enable an estimated 17,500,000 persons to see the last hour of the final round of this classic sports event, which has been telecast nationally only once before. The National Open is considered golf's richest prize, since victory is worth \$10,000 in subsequent endorsements to the winner. Advance registrations in this year's Open include more than 150 of the world's outstanding professional and amateur golfers. Heading the list will be defending champion Ed Furgol, who overcame the handicap of a withered arm last year to capture the cup by one stroke from Gene Littler in a brilliant display of skill and control. Littler again is expected to be one of his chief opponents.

Buntan Ben Hogan, who will be guarding this year for an unprecedented fifth U. S. Open championship, probably will be on deck, as will his old rival, Sam Snead, who has never won it. Others will include Cary Middlecott, Mike Souchak, Julius Boros, Lew Worsham and many others.

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
