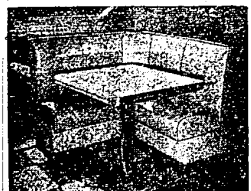

Speaks Of Merger Of Two Churches

Guest speaker at the Farmington Universalist church recently was the Reverend Doctor Braikard Gibbons, general superintendent of the Universalist Church of America.

In a speech to parishioners he stressed the importance of a proposed merger of the Universalist and Unitarian churches.

The merger is necessary, Reverend Gibbons stated, because the two denominations work and think alike and have a common cause. He cautioned, however, that many details have yet to be worked out and anticipated that at least four years would be required to complete the proposed action.

Both the Unitarian and Universalist Churches were developed in New England shortly after the turn of the 19th century, he stated. The Universalists began by stressing the idea of a universal salvation with a belief that a God of Love could not condemn any man to punishment. The Unitarians based their belief on one God also and refused to believe in the Trinity. Since their beginnings, both groups have grown progressively more liberal and have become more and more alike in their beliefs.
