The committee went to Washington, was politely snubbed and told that refineries, if controlled at all, are under the jurisdiction of the Federal government.

With the latest increase, Attorney General Thomas M. Kavanaugh started his own check in cooperation with Gov. Williams.

Representatives of major refineries met with Kavanaugh but the results were not disclosed. Kavanaugh and others are interested in determining whether refineries operating in Michigan can be regulated by the Michigan Public Service Commission, which now controls utilities.

Some decision on the legal phases of the idea are expected before the summer is ended, but Broomfield said it would repeat his 1953 findings. Motorists will have to pay the higher prices.
