Graduates From Central Michigan College June 12

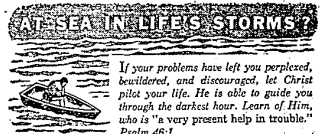

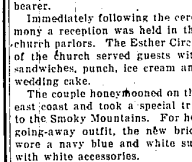
