SCATTERED WILD PUBLIC LAND AREAS GET PLANT KILLER

About 2200 acres of wild public land, scattered in a number of small parcels, were sprayed with plant-killing chemicals this summer to create openings for wildlife.

Most wild animals in Michigan, except for squirrels and other tree dwellers, are creatures of the forest edge. Wildlife alternates between forest and open land and in general it can be said that such edge areas are preferred for nesting.

So spraying strips of scrubby tree growth in forests opens up such edge areas for wild animals to use.

The Conservation Department used both aerial and ground spray equipment this year and the areas involved were scattered throughout the state.

Included in the northern spraying were four areas totalling 795 acres sprayed for sharp-tailed grouse openings, 420 acres in strips to produce close-ground deer browse, and a number of small patches for woodcock openings.

In southern Michigan, about 1000 acres of state game areas were aerial and ground sprayed to produce edge areas for small game in general.

(Continued from Page Two) when you run smack into the law. That's what I call for help and secure the peace of mind that goes with being certain of a "fair shake."

Yes, sir, if a policeman came for me and had a warrant with my name on it in big letters - I wouldn't give him a hard time, because he has a legal order to arrest me. He wouldn't have that warrant unless some judge or jurist of the peace had been convinced by a person with firsthand information on a signed complaint, that there was good reason to believe I had committed a certain criminal act. Or, perhaps, a grand jury has worked my case over and found enough reason for an indictment. A warrant as a rule isn't easily come by.

Even without a warrant, a police officer could legally arrest me if he had reasonable grounds to believe I had committed a serious crime, or was attempting to commit one.

Although I knew a cop was dead wrong - that I was 100 per cent in the clear - I wouldn't pull any funny stuff. Sure, I'm entitled to bring suit for damages in a case of false arrest, but again I'd want some straight advice, for chances are that almost any well-trained police officer could do the pretty strong proof that he had reasonable grounds for his action.

Something else I figured out the other day, too. With chances being that the police officer knows when he's making a lawful arrest, I could be completely innocent of the charge he was arresting me for, but if I started a hassle, I could suddenly become as guilty as you-know-what of a second crime, that of resisting an officer.

Yes, I'll go quietly. Then, with my lawyer beside me, I'll let those American civil rights go to work!

To save limb and trouble, hunters should observe "the letter of the law" when importing migratory game birds from Canada this fall.

Birds brought into the U. S. from Canada must have head, head plumage and feet attached and, where required, must be accompanied by provincial export permits.

Other regulations should be checked with international boundary authorities before hunting.

(Continued from Page 2A) day drive. The period will be called Citizenship Week. The governor has also issued a proclamation asking for wide spread participation in the promotion to insure registration of all eligible voters.

Various activities will be seen in various areas. In metropolitan areas branch registration offices will be set up, manned by firemen, policemen or other volunteers. In other localities, telephone campaigns will be organized. Bulletin boards will remind people to register. Newspapers, radio and TV will carry the message.

HUMOROUS SUGGESTION was submitted by the editor of a northern weekly newspaper in an open letter to the "New Secretary of State - Whoever You Are."

The editor referred to the running battle about the site of the jet interceptor base in northern Michigan, calling it a "Lazey Susan basis: stopping here and there."

He suggested that the matter be left to the U. S. Navy. The base could then be built on an aircraft carrier, which could steam to the area which satisfied the most political pressures. Other advantage of this plan were listed: no roads required; no television towers; no regional district boundaries. In the summer it could be moved from the National Misp Camp area, because, he says, no enemy would be expected to attack during "music season."

SLOGANS ON LICENSE plates describing the wonders of Michigan may be abandoned in 1957.

It all started when Secretary of State James M. Hare assigned a committee to a study of highway safety measures and an anonymous attorney questioned the right of the state to advertise on license plates.

Hare mentioned that the National Safety Council was recommending that the state drop the slogans to make the digits more readable.

Then came the dissenters. Robert J. Purling, executive secretary of the Michigan Tourist Council, asked Hare to spare that slogan until the facts could be gathered.

He said he had a letter from the National Safety Council, denying a recommendation one way or the other on the slogans. At the moment, the issue still is unsettled.

Gitchee Gumee, the locale of Longfellow's "The Song of Hiawatha," is the Lake Superior area of northern Michigan. Longfellow drew his information for the poem from Henry Schoolcraft, an Indian historian and scientist who lived at Sault Ste. Marie.

A lithograph print of Davy Crockett on display at the Chicago Public Library shows him in the outfit he wore to Congress - swallow-tail coat and all the trimmings. On it, in his own hand, is this inscription: "The only correct likeness that has been made of me."

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
