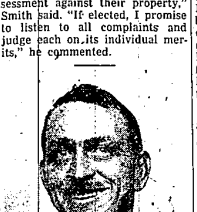

### Tooth Decay Cost Set At \$31 Million Yearly In State

Tooth decay is the most expensive disease afflicting residents of this state, the Michigan Department of Health said today.

Michigan residents pay \$31,000,000 a year for dental care, more than any other state, the department estimated.

Professional dental care in itself isn't expensive, the department said. Big dental bills occur in most cases after visits to the dentist have been "put off" for long periods of time.

Dental decay also is the state's most widespread disease, affecting 95 per cent of the people in Michigan.

Half of all children have at least one decayed tooth when they reach their second birthday. At the age of 17 years, the average youngster has seven decayed teeth and by the time he is 21 he has lost five teeth because of decay.

Youngsters aren't the only ones in trouble because of tooth decay. Half of all adults have at least one age new dentures, the department pointed out.

Despite the pain and expense it is now causing, dental decay can be largely controlled, the department said, by following this four-point plan from childhood:

1—Eat a well-balanced diet low in sugar.  
2—Drink fluoridated water from birth or have fluorides painted on tooth surfaces of children.  
3—Brush teeth at least once a day immediately after eating.  
4—Visit a dentist regularly starting at three years of age.
