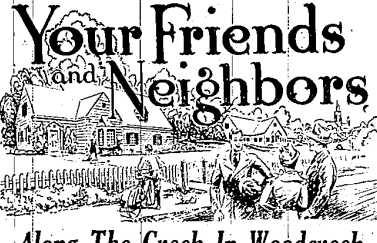

Teachers Found Discipline Hard In Old Michigan

ANN ARBOR — The Little Red Schoolhouse had its Blackboard Jungle days a century ago. At the time, a teacher's diary in the possession of The University of Michigan Historical Collections. Disputes were settled with shovels and pickaxes.
 The diary was kept by Elizabeth Gurney, age 17, who lived with her mother and father and sister, Clara, at a farm on Centreville in St. Joseph County.
 Lizzie's entry for December 26, 1857, makes it clear that it's nothing new for kids to latch onto school authorities: "Mr. Sadler (the teacher) talked to the scholars about communication (taking off of turn). In the afternoon Fletcher Bateman, Lewis Tabel, and William Price communicated. Mr. Sadler wanted to know why they did not comply with this request. They did not tell."
 "He requested them to leave the room till he could have a chance to talk with them. They went to the corner of the road and waited some time for them to go. At last he took up the poker and told them to go."
 Lizzie continues: "They went as far as the store where Mr. Price jerked off his coat and pulled up his shirt sleeves. Fletcher took the shovel and told Mr. Sadler that if he wanted to fight they were ready for him. Mr. Sadler said he had no wish to do so. All that he wanted was order in the school and that he must have or he would resign."
 "At last he made peace with them, shook hands with Price, who had been the worst of them, and sent them to their seats. Fletcher said they should consider him a visitor the rest of the afternoon. As soon as all was cooled down he went on with our regular classroom recitations. School was dismissed half an hour earlier than usual."
 Lizzie's diary is now in the Michigan Historical Collections.

One-Fifth Of Food Budget Should Go For Milk Products

Consumer Marketing Information agents state that approximately one-fifth or one-fifth of the total food allotment should be spent on milk and milk products such as cheese.
 Four cups of milk will provide the recommended amount of calcium whereas other foods containing calcium must be used in such large quantities that they are neglected. Agents say the Marketing Information agents.
 Milk is also a good food when you are shopping for protein. Buy a 10-cent carton of milk usually gives about twice as much protein as ten cents spent for round steak, or 23 per cent more protein than ten cents worth of hamburger or eggs. Milk is good and useable to the last drop! No waste problem is involved.
 Each day children should have three cups to one quart of milk while adults need two to three cups.
 If you are counting calories, count on milk in up-to-date diets for losing or gaining weight. Milk is relied upon as a basic food—the nearly perfect food—which can be divided up, they point out. It is saving money on your family's supply of milk is important to you, check prices on two-quart containers. It may be advantageous to you to carry it home from the store. Another way to investigate discounts for large purchases from your milk man. And, for use evaporated or dry milk in cooking. Look for all the kinds of milk you can buy! There is a kind to suit every budget, need and taste.
 Don't overlook cheese either. Five quarts of milk are needed to produce one pound of cheese. For concentrated food value remember that the average cheese for one sandwich represents one glass of milk.

Soft Curves, Wood Look Cited As New Furniture Trend

Soft curved lines and the natural wood look will continue to be the style trend for summer furniture, states Merril Shipley, home furnishings professor at Michigan State University. "French Provincial furniture is still very popular, she points out. This includes casual, seated and feminine-looking pieces which fit into today's small houses.
 Little or no wrought iron is being used, but there is a growing popularity for combinations of brass, wood and gold. Black is tops, she points out, but not the thin wrought iron look. Instead chrome, aluminum and magnesium are taking over the big metal look.
 The Scandinavian influence is particularly popular, Miss Shipley declares. This is evidenced by chairs with the rounded look and a semi-detached back and seat. The upholstered part is also semi-detached from the wood.
 Color-wise, there seems to be a tendency to show a lot of neutral background colors with vividly intense colors such as red and orange as accents.
 A current trend to very low dining tables and chairs is explained by Miss Shipley as good for casual snacking, but for main meals, not too functional. Along with old furniture styles such as this, she points out, the furniture is not bought today as it was 50 years ago. Then furniture was bought for a lifetime of use, but today's homemakers tend to change their furnishings often and can afford to swing along somewhat with the current trend.
