Clarenceville High PTA Holds Final Meeting, Year-End Reports Given

Members of the Parent-Teachers Association at Clarenceville High School attended the final meeting of the year, Tuesday, May 21, in the high school cafeteria.

A yearly report of the activities of the PTA was given by Mrs. Paul Stevenson, historian. The report included the records of all committees and of all activities sponsored by the organization.

Following the historian's report, Mrs. Robert Dennis reported on her trip as a delegate to the Michigan Council of PTA held at Traverse City, earlier this month.

Members decided that the PTA should donate \$100 to the American Field Service to aid in the foreign exchange program at Clarenceville. \$75 is to be sent to the foreign exchange student who will attend Clarenceville next year, and \$25 will be given to Gretchen Van Camp, a junior at the school, who will tour Germany as an exchange student from the United States this summer.

Scouts from Troop 288 were in attendance at the meeting for the presentation of the troop charter. The Troop is sponsored by the PTA and receives financial aid from the group.

Following the regular business meeting, John Turlo of the Clarenceville faculty presented slides on Europe. Mr. Turlo spent three years in Europe teaching at an American Dependent School in Germany. His slides included photos of France, England, Denmark, Germany, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Austria and Holland.

During the time Mr. Turlo was teaching in Europe, he was employed by schools in Kaiserslautern and Frankfurt.

Refreshments were served at the conclusion of the meeting.

College Planned By 25 Seniors

Much of the present talk among seniors is of plans being made by those who have selected colleges to attend in the forthcoming school year.

At the present time, 25 members of the class of '57 have received acceptance notices from colleges and universities. 25 of these students have been granted scholarships and grants-in-aid.

Scholarships have been awarded to Betty Edwards, who will attend Eastern Michigan College (education); Marie Wyss, Madonna College (journalism); Gary Gay and Donald Melton, Michigan College of Mining and Technology (electrical and mechanical engineering); and Karen Brown, Mount Carmel School of Nursing (nursing).

Kay Mann has received a grant-in-aid from Albion College toward a liberal arts education.

Other students who will attend college in the fall include: David Aho, University of Detroit (engineering); Catherine Barnes, Wayne State (education); Dianne Benson, Frances Knicely, Janet Van Arnam and Violet Paatalo, Highland Park Junior College (secretarial); Roy Warrick, Michigan College of Mining and Technology (engineering); Marion Dalley, University of Michigan, (dental hygiene); Dale Devitt, Ithaca (liberal arts); Elda St. Joseph, St. Joseph's (nursing); Nancy Labowski, University of Detroit (education); Barbara Lesniewicz and Bill Waack, Henry Ford Community College (secretarial and general); Sandra Muirhead, Wayne State (education); Joyce McKinney, Highland Park (general) and Russell Waack, Michigan College of Mining and Technology (engineering).

These students represent about one-fourth of the graduating seniors class at Clarenceville. Others have applied at colleges and have not as yet received official notification of their acceptance. It is expected that a great number of the students will also enter college in the fall.

Exposition Held Tuesday

Something new in the way of exhibits was held at Clarenceville High School Tuesday evening, May 28.

A student exhibit of work was combined with exhibits from various companies for the first time. The entire program was presented to parents of students at the school as well as others interested in the exposition.

The exhibits included in the display showed the work of students in the science, art, industrial arts and homemaking departments. The projects were prepared during the current school year and were included in the actual classroom activities of the students.

With these student exhibits was a series of displays and projects representing various industrial firms in the area. The firms presented interesting and educational projects which produced a better understanding of the more technical aspects of the companies' enterprise.

The student exposition grew out of the original plan of Darwin Larson and Robert Thompson to hold a science exhibit. From this plan came the notion to include business firms in the event. Gradually the scope of the exhibit was extended to include other departments in the Clarenceville School.
