

CITY ANNEXATION TO BECOME OFFICIAL JUNE 1

Officials reported this week that the recently approved annexation from the Township to the City of 170 acres of land along the east side of Farmington Road between Eight and Nine Mile Roads will become effective June 1.

The annexation was approved by the voters at the Annual Spring Election in April. Preliminary plans have already been submitted to the City Planning Commission for a proposed subdivision to be constructed north of the light industrial zone facing on Eight Mile Road.

Officials stated that the newly annexed area will be added to the city maps following the June 1 effective date.

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

BY: BAYARD TUPPER THOSE OUTDOOR STAIRS

In your zeal to tackle new outdoor projects during the good weather, don't overlook important jobs that will save you expense and worry in the long run.

A lot of people, for instance, neglect to keep an eye on the state of repair of outdoor wooden stairs, such as those attached to porches and laundry stoops. Naturally, an outdoor stair, being set to moisture and extremes of temperature, needs a lot more attention than one located inside a house.

The main points to check are the stringers (the pieces that run diagonally to hold up the steps), and the steps themselves.

Particularly if they were never painted properly, stringers will sometimes crack under the strain of continual use. You can remedy this by halting a two-by-four along the inside, the full length of the stringer. Don't use nails — they might split the wood even more. Three-quarter inch carriage bolts, inserted in 3/16ths holes bored through the stringers and the two-by-fours will do the trick.

If the stringers have a saw-tooth pattern, and these "teeth" are showing signs of rotting, cut the saw-tooth portion off and replace it with a triangular piece screwed or bolted firmly into place.

The steps themselves should be checked for excessive wear (in which case they can be turned over) and for splintering or rotting, two types of trouble that may call for replacement of one or more individual treads.

Finally, when the stairs are back in good repair, don't neglect the one all-important task that will save a lot of trouble in the future, as well as giving them a smarter appearance: give them one or more coats of a good quality exterior porch paint. We have a few quarts that we are closing out at a bargain.

ONLY PERSONS not already registered in their respective school districts need to make application. All voters must be registered and qualified in order to participate in the annual school elections. Any person having questions regarding their registration status are urged to contact their respective city or township clerk prior to the May 31 deadline.

At the annual Farmington school election, voters will select one member to the Board of Education for a term of three years. In addition they will be asked to decide on whether or not the Board shall be authorized to sell the German School property at the highest obtainable price. They will also be asked to vote on a second proposition, providing for the transfer of \$1,904.75 from the 1945 debt fund to the 1953 debt.

Clarenceville electors will name two members to the Board of Education for terms of three years each, will vote as to whether or not to authorize the transfer of \$331.50 from the 1948 debt fund to the 1955 debt fund.
