Tour Of Interesting, Unique Gardens In Area Set June 22, 23

One of the focal points during the public display of Farmington area gardens June 22, 23 as part of the annual Detroit Garden Center tour will be the Knox House, now owned by the Presbyterian Church. It was built by Marcus Burrough, the well-known designer of fine homes.

On display at Knox House will be the 10th Anniversary Flower Show of the Farmington Junior Garden Club. Punch will be served by the Farmington Garden Club as one of the features of its 23rd Anniversary celebration.

Another point of interest to be visited is the country estate of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Dean, 27600 W. 12 Mile Road. The grounds have been planted with over one thousand evergreens, a wide expanse of lawn and formal garden. A lake on the property has become a refuge for wild ducks, geese, cranes and other waterfowl. Visits with the past will be provided at both the Robert Crooks and Dan Guy residences.

The stone house of Mr. and Mrs. Crooks, 40491 W. 12 Mile Road, was built in 1814 and is furnished with Queen Anne period antiques. The garden of Mr. and Mrs. James P. Henry at 24560 Orchard Lake Road is a fine example of a do-it-yourself gardening following a master plan prepared by a landscape architect. The result shows what can be planted, and maintained by any green-thumbed gardener, with appropriate areas for outdoor living. Mrs. Henry, well known in garden circles for her artistic work with flowers, will display floral arrangements

throughout the house. Mr. and Mrs. William E. Taylor, 25280 Westmoreland, will show a typical suburban setting with accent on outdoor living. A lake, shared by five families, provides year-round pleasure and a unique experiment in community cooperation. A rustic bridge connects the Taylor yard with a small landscaped island. Across the street from the Taylors' is one of the many neat bogs that crop out in different areas in Farmington.

Tickets for advance sale have been distributed to local civic organizations. They may also be purchased from the tour co-ordinators: Mrs. Philip Henuall, GR. 4-6823, and Mrs. Richard Lancaster, GR. 4-6832.

Tickets are good at any garden in any area, Mrs. Henuall stated. The only restriction is that they be used on the correct dates for the areas listed.
