Farmington's Jaycees are finishing plans for a big night on Sept. 30 when they will host to all the Jaycee Chapters in District Nine, south Oakland County.

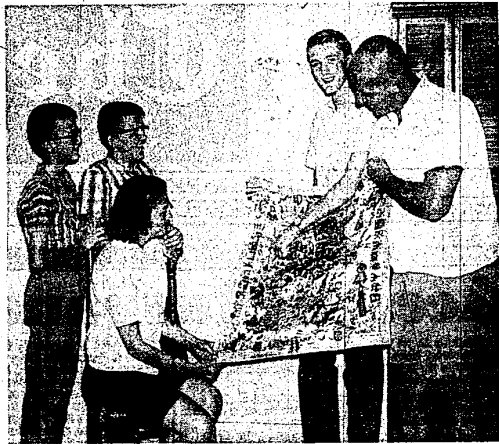
Farmington Resident New County Home Economist

After hearing presentations Pro and Con, an assembly of residents of Olde Homestead subdivision voted their approval of plans for the "Village Green" project which involves a golf course, apartments and traveler hostelry. Reportedly, the vote came as a shock to those who called the meeting, believing that the vote would be negative and could be used as a "weapon" to try to kill the proposal before the Farmington Township zoning board. Actually Olde Homestead is half a mile away from the proposed Village Green.

Farmington School District Board of Education met in a secret "special discussion session" Monday evening. Views were aired and questions asked on an auditor's report, additions to the Bond School kitchen and the employee insurance program under study. At the beginning of the meeting the Board went into "executive session" and closed the meeting to the Observer reporter and the public. They seemed to regard the secret session as "normal."

As a spectator at the meeting, Ralph Yoder brought the subject of whether parking requirements were "winked at" for the builders of Brookdale Club apartments before the Farmington City Council.

Reading an item from The Observer newspaper suggesting that such had happened, Yoder asked the Council to comment. City manager John Dinan replied that while the Council itself had done nothing to ease the rules, the Board of Appeals had granted a "waiver" to Brookdale permitting 1.5 parking places per unit, rather than the 1.5 spaces required by ordinance. Dinan said they did it "apparently because they thought the requirements of 1.5 unnecessary in this particular situation."

Councilman Henry Foster noted that he "long had complained about the absolute power of the Board of Appeals." He added, "... the Council has no control over the appeals board at all, unless we want to fire the members . . . they are a little supreme court who can act independent of everybody else in city government, when they wish."
