# Judge Permits Pumping Again

On Wednesday, Nov. 25, Oakland County Circuit Judge Philip Pratt lifted the temporary restraining order he had imposed on the pumping operation being carried on in Farmington Township's Meadowbrook Hills Subdivision, by the Shelby Const. Co. That pumping, necessary to the construction of the Tarabost Sewer, has caused a number of wells to go dry in the subdivision. At the same time, Judge Pratt ruled that those whose wells have gone dry may sue the Township and the County for damages. He also directed the Township to deliver sanitary water to, and pick-up garbage from, the subdivision. Robert Steadman, lawyer for Stan Edwards, one of the waterless residents, urged that he be restrained from pumping until water lines can be brought in. During the period in which the restraining order has been in effect, one of the wells has come back into operation. After about an hour in open court, the Judge called Steadman and Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan into his chambers for another hour.

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justly treated, went at the police. And the riot was on.

According to the police, Mrs. Rose then assaulted Officer Peoples, who was assisting in the attempt to subdue her husband. Edward Christensen of Farmington Township was also interfering with the arrest of Rose. In the melee, Rose managed to hit Officer James Strand.

They were soon joined by Township Officers Peoples and Carol Holland, and officers of the State Police and Oakland County Sheriff's Office. According to the police report, the officers were assaulted by Dennis Gundick of Farmington. According to the report, some of the combatants began to arm themselves with cue sticks and balls. Mrs. Rose and several other women would not leave; would not even stop drinking, according to the police.

When the rioters were finally subdued, Gundick had to be taken to the Redford Community Hospital. Timberlake, Christensen, the Roses, and Thomas J. Beeny of Farmington Township, were all arrested on charges of assault and battery, and placed on \$500 bond. The scene at the Farmington Township Police Station was one of continued rowdiness. After a long struggle, Gundick was subdued and taken outside. While attempting to put Gundick into the police car, Officer Williams was assaulted by Ronald Rose, and Jerry Timberlake of Detroit. The fight now concentrated outside at a number of the patrons, led by Timberlake, continued to try to prevent the officers from taking Gundick away. At this point, the fire truck came. Lt.
