Local Teachers Have Big Part In Institute

Farmington teachers will be taking a very active part in the two-day-long teachers institute and workshop sessions being held this Thursday and Friday, Oct. 15 and 16, for all public school teachers in southeastern Michigan.

This two-day program is for teachers in Regions 2, 6 and 7 of the Michigan Education Association which includes the counties of Oakland, Wayne (outside of Detroit), Macomb and St. Clair.

Farmington will be hosting sessions this year on Friday and local teachers will also be active in presenting or assisting with workshop sessions at other schools outside the local district.

Today, Thursday, the program for all teachers will be at Cobo Hall in Detroit where both teachers and administrators will hear leaders in the field of education not only from Michigan but from all parts of the nation.

THE TOPIC group meetings to be held at various schools throughout the area on Friday will be numerous.

One of these topic sessions will be on "Speech, Radio and Drama" and will be led by all Southeastern Michigan teachers interested at North Farmington High.

Lloyd Smith, debate coach at Farmington High School, is chairman of the session, and Judith A. Rohm, North Farmington director of speech arts, is co-chairman. The session will include lectures and discussions by experts in the field of debate, forensics, drama, and radio. It will feature a demonstration by 70 students of the North Farmington Speech Debate League.

Immunization Programs Set For 4 Schools

Acting on a request from the Oakland County Health Department, the Farmington Board of Education gave official approval Monday night for conducting immunization programs at four schools in the Farmington school system this year.

The schools where these programs will be offered will be Planders, Gill, Shawwassee and William Grace.

Students will be given two shots of multi-purpose vaccine to afford them protection against diphtheria, smallpox, polio and tetanus.

While no official dates have been set for the administering of the two immunization shots at these four schools, Supt. G. V. Harrison indicated that the first series of shots should probably be scheduled for the last week in October and the second series for sometime in November.

Kuhn-Farnum Debate Slated

All K. of C. members will be invited to bring gifts, Meagher said.

Act on Sewer and Water Extension For Township's Industrial Park Area

The Farmington Township Board took action at their regular meeting Monday night, October 12, approving agreements with the Oakland County Department of Public Works to extend water and sewer facilities into the Township's industrial park areas.

The action paves the way for the final phase of construction on the \$785,000 Tarabusi Sewer Arm which will serve approximately 4,600 acres of land in the Township.

THE EXTENSION of the Tarabusi Arm is part of the project put under construction

in the first part of June this year and originally scheduled for completion by November 22, 1964. A strike by construction workers which lasted from June 8 until the second week in August has moved the target date forward to February of 1965.

Diamond National, the first company to purchase land in the Township's industrial park area for a plant site, does not plan to be ready to occupy their new plant before April and so the delay in construction will provide the needed services to them and others

who are planning to locate in the area has created no problems for Township officials.

Supervisor Curtis H. Hall said the Township first began work on providing water and sewer facilities in the industrially zoned area bordered by Haggerty Road to the west, Haledale Road to the east, U.S. 16 to the north and Nine-and-a-half Mile to the south, as early as 1960.

Although the Township applied for a federal grant, under the accelerated public works program, in February of 1963 the grant was not finally ap-

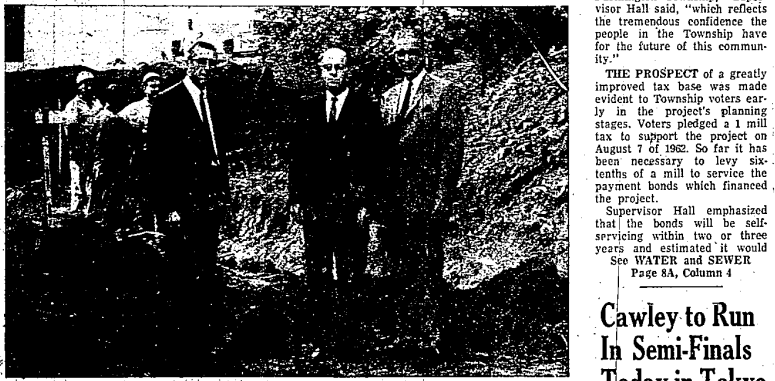
proved until January of this year, nearly a year later.

THE OAKLAND County DPW, headed by R. J. Alexander, serves as the agent for the Township in applying for the federal grant which totaled \$375,000. Supervisor Hall credited the County DPW with securing the grant and taking the steps to follow through with the actual engineering, construction and maintenance operations within the 120-day limit it required by the federal government.

"This is a milestone for Farmington Township," reflects Supervisor Hall said, "which reflects the tremendous confidence the people in the Township have for the future of this community."

THE PROSPECT of a greatly improved tax base was made evident to Township voters early in the actual planning stages. Voters pledged a 1 mill tax to support the project on August 7 of 1962. So far it has been estimated that over six-tenths of a mill to service the payment bonds which financed the project.

Supervisor Hall emphasized that the mill will be self-servicing within two or three years and estimated it would See WATER and SEWER Page 8A, Column 4

Part-time Community Relations Coordinator For Schools Proposed

A part-time community relations coordinator may soon be added to the Farmington public school system's central office staff if Board of Education members follow the recommendation of Supt. G. V. Harrison made to them at their regular meeting Monday night.

He pointed out to board members that he and Clifford Smart, superintendent of the Walled Lake School District, had been discussing and exploring into the possibility of hiring a qualified community relations coordinator for a considerable period of time now.

HARRISON stated that both were in agreement that neither district could afford a full-time person for this work at this time but that a part-time person working for both districts would be feasible.

Detroit Water In Some Homes

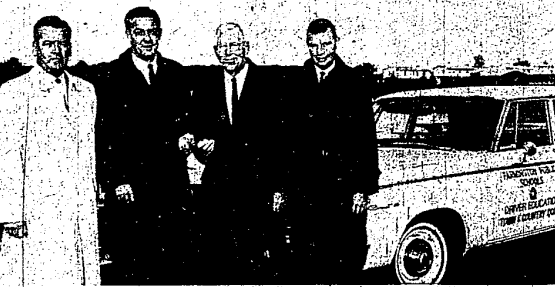
