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

Kimberley, burdened of late with more than her share of grief, was again stunned last week by yet another sudden death within her ranks. Ray Butters, 48, of Eleven Mile, was stricken with a heart attack at home early in the morning of November 12. Helen and her boys, Skip, 23, Bob, 18, and Rich, 14, are extended our deepest sympathy and prayers with the hope that they may derive some comfort from the knowledge that we all share their sorrow.

As a result, the request for rezoning was tabled to allow time for another meeting of Kimberley residents.

THIS MEETING has now been scheduled for Tuesday night, November 24, at Beechview School. It is absolutely imperative that every Kimberley some be represented at this meeting, and you are urged to do nothing prevent your attendance.
