

Falcon Cagers Defeat Wayne In Christmas Tourney, 74-69

The Farmington High School basketball team fought off a late scoring surge from the Wayne quintet to win the first round in the Christmas Basketball Tournament, 74-69, before a good crowd in the FHS gym Monday night, December 28.

Falcon coach Jack Quiggle watched his cagers outscore Wayne in the opening period of the game, 19-11, and maintain at least a five-point bulge up until the dying minutes of the game. JOHN OLANDER, the sharp shooting Falcon guard, scored in 23 points before leaving the game on fouls with two minutes left on the clock. Olander led both teams in scoring and set a good example throughout the game. Wayne was immediately felt by Farmington.

Farmington led at the half, 38 to 31, and held that seven point margin throughout the third period action which ended, 57-50, with the Falcon cagers in command.

In the fourth stanza blitz by Wayne brought the score even, 65-65, and as the final minute of play ticked away the visitors took the lead from the Falcons, 68-65.

Wayne had a one-point lead and possession of the ball with just 30 seconds left in the game when Farmington got its winning break. A Wayne player tried a long shot. The Falcons got the rebound and quickly called a time out to talk over strategy.

COACH QUIGGLE told his players to work the ball in to Roy Leach. And they did. Leach was fouled on a drive in for the Wayne basket, and made both of the free throws he was awarded to once again give Farmington control, 70-69.

After Leach's tying and tie-breaking free throws, Wayne came back down the floor only to have one of their passes intercepted by Falcon Mike Wilson.

WILSON, on a break-away, took the intercepted pass and converted a field goal to see the game for Farmington. The scoring was capped as Wilson made two charity tosses resulting from fouls called on Wayne as he went in for his break away shot and seconds later when he went to the line following Ron Cleveland's interception of a Wayne pass which set up another drive in for Wilson.

The buzzer sounded with Farmington out in front, 74 to 69.

Secretors for Farmington were: John Olander, 27; Roy Leach, 21; Mike Wilson, 9; Steve Moore, 8; and Gregg Dorow, 7. Bob Neff's Southfield cagers easily got past Ypsilanti, 96-73, in the opening action of the tourney Monday night.

Book Criticism Policy Amended By Board of Ed.

The procedure for handling criticism of library book selections for the Farmington Public Schools came up for discussion at the December 23 meeting of the Board of Education and an amendment to the policy was adopted.

In August of 1963, the board adopted the philosophy of book selection as set up in the Library Bill of Rights of the American Library Association. Included in the policy was the following outline for handling criticism of material (when the authoring principal feels that he cannot resolve the problem):

"CRITICISM MUST be presented in a written and signed statement directed to the Superintendent of Schools. It must include specific information as to author, title, and publisher; the reason for the criticism; giving specific references to those aspects of the book considered objectionable. If possible, a suggested substitute for the book should be included.

The Superintendent shall appoint a committee, among whose members shall be included representatives from the department of school libraries and persons in the subject matter field of the materials challenged. The books or materials involved will be withdrawn pending a decision in writing by the above committee. The decision will be sent to the Superintendent, who will, in turn, inform the persons concerned."

HERBERT NEAL, board trustee, pointed out that there was no provision for a member of the general public to be included on the committee.

In discussion, Sup. Gerald V. Harrison stated that so far, there had been no complaints that had not been satisfactorily resolved by a school principal, and that if it became necessary to appoint a committee, he would be especially careful in appointing an unbiased one.

MRS. PATRICIA DATES, board trustee, questioned the advisability of appointing a member of the community "who has no legal responsibility" to such a committee. She suggested that Board of Education members be asked to select representatives if the public could serve in that capacity.

After discussion, the board adopted the following amendment to the Library Book Selection Policy under "Procedure for Handling Criticism": "If the decision is unsatisfactory to the complainant, the matter shall be submitted to the Board of Education for final disposition."
