Give Students Trips Abroad

Students in Syracuse University's Master of International Public Administration degree program get round-trip tickets to India or Pakistan. Other aspects of the course include being taught one of two Indian languages and attending lectures by a distinguished expert in international law and foreign policy. If the student is married his spouse may accompany him to an Asian port. LAURENCE B. DEWITT of 33135 West 14 Mile Road in Farmington, is one of the instructors going to India and Pakistan. The two-year degree program, in S. U.'s Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, began in 1953 with a group of 10 students who worked and studied in India for 11 months. This class returns to Syracuse by Feb. 1 for a final semester on campus before graduation. Twelve are in the second class, which leaves Feb. 13 to begin international assignments in India and Pakistan. A SPOKESMAN in the School said it is the only program sponsored by an American university whose students actually serve overseas in a quasi-governmental capacity. Most of the internships are in the political, economic and administrative sections of the U.S. embassies in New Delhi, Karachi and Decca, or in offices of the Agency for International Development and the U.S. Information Service.
