The North Farmington High School basketball team wrapped up the conference title in the Northwest Suburban Conference last Friday night by scoring a hard-fought 67 to 64 victory over a game rival Birmingham Groves.

The Raiders, coached by Dick Wilson, closed out the league action with a fine 82 record in the six-team circuit. The victory was aided by the Raider cagers' game in games with Groves and Thurston. The other league teams—Oak Park, John Glenn and Franklin, each bowed in the two meetings during the season.

RICK SCHULTZ led the Raider scoring attack in the victory at Birmingham Groves with 19 points. Rick Leutenant notched 17 points in the North Farmington effort.
