Olander took court honors for the game with 26 points. Teammates Leach and Mike Ames added 12 and 11 points, respectively, while Wilson and George Habicht dropped in nine apiece.

## Raider Quintet Wins Regular Season Finale

The North Farmington Raiders closed their regular season Thursday night with a 69-54 win over Waterford Kettering.

Rick Lorenz scored 22 points for the Raiders and played a good defensive game at guard position. Rick Schultz, the high scoring Raider forward, dumped in 17 points.

JOHN McDONALD, senior forward and top rebounder, scored 13 points in his last regular season game.

North Farmington took off to a 24-18 point lead in the first quarter as Rick Schultz poured in 10 and Rick Lorenz gunned for 7 points.

At the end of the first half, North Farmington was leading 38-31 as Waterford Kettering halted to match the Raiders offensively.

North Farmington was leading by a 10 point margin at the third quarter closed, 51 to 41.

Waterford Kettering outscored the Raiders in the fourth quarter 13-9, but the Raiders' 10 points was too much of a burden to overcome as the Raiders ended 69-54 in favor of North Farmington.

Farmington has sent its third poem in as many years to the Atlantic magazine Creative Writing Contest.

Mr. Lee S. Peel believes that the poem is good enough for this national competition, an annual event which draws up poetry from high school students all over the country. In 1963, a poem by Walt Grimalda, Class of '63, won fourth spot, and in 1964, a poem by another student in the same contest gained a third place. Mr. Peel doubts that Woehler's poem will follow this pattern by taking second place in the nation, "but it should receive some type of recognition."

Mr. Peel commented, "The poem is the freshest and most original of any I read this year.
