Review FHS Cage Season

Though compiling a disappointing season record of 6-13, the Falcon basketball team finished strongly to salvage a modest campaign. While beating North Farmington twice and finishing as runners-up in the district tourney, the eagles received strong individual performances from various players.

Senior John Olander led all Farmington scorers for 4.8 year, totaling 372 points in 19 games for a 19.5 average. Olander's points came on 143 field goals and 56 free throws, as he scored 25 markers or more on nine different occasions. The most versatile player on the team, "O" hit from close in and far out while playing guard, forward, and center.

Second on the scoring list was Junior guard, Mike Wilson, who pumped in 238 points on 92 field goals and 51 free throws for a 12.5 average. Because being one of the most consistent scorers on the team, Wilson used his harassing defensive tactics to cause many errors by opposing players.

Skating Rink, Golf Range Plans Denied

Plans for an indoor year-round ice-skating rink were denied by the Township Zoning Board at their March 26 meeting because the plans also included an outdoor golf driving range.

The request was for rezoning of two five acre parcels on the west side of Orchard Lake Road, between Twelve and Thirteen Mile roads.

Board members told petitioners Albert A. Starker and Donald H. Wolvortan that they felt the ice-skating rink would be a desirable recreational facility in the Township and would consider it alone. They would not approve the outdoor driving range because of the possible annoyance of nearby residents by floodlight.

Members cited as an example the driving range on Grand River Avenue where lighting control has never been satisfactory. The proponents gave no indication that they might consider erecting the rink alone.

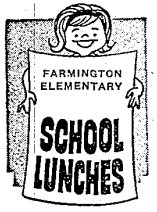
