

Confirmation Rites Scheduled At Trinity Church This Sunday

The Rt. Rev. Richard S. Emrich, Bishop of Michigan, will visit Trinity Church for the 10:30 a.m. service on May 11, to perform the Apostolic Rite of the Laying on of Hands for those who have prepared themselves for Confirmation.

Bishop Emrich was born in Marburg, Germany, in 1910, of missionary parents. Following graduation from Phillips Andover Academy, he attended Brown University, the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, and Union Theological Seminary in New York City, and later studied at the University of Marburg in Germany.

Coming to the Diocese of Michigan from the staff of the Episcopal Theological School in 1946, Bishop Emrich has been very active in local affairs. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Detroit Council of Churches, and has served as its president. He is also Chairman of Michigan Committee on Fair Election Practices, a member of the Michigan Citizens Council of the National Probation and Parole Association; a Trustee of the Citizens Redevelopment Corporation of Detroit and Chairman of Detroit's Medical and Hospital Study Committee.

The members of Trinity Church extend a cordial welcome to all who wish to attend the Bishop's Confirmation message. The church is located one-half mile north of Eleven Mile Road in Springland Subdivision.

Antioch Luth. To Install First Pastor Sunday

This Sunday, during the morning worship service, Rev. James E. Henneberger, Mission Developer for the Board of Missions, United Lutheran Church in America, will officially install as the first pastor of Antioch Evangelical Lutheran Church.

In charge of the service of installation will be the Rev. Dr. Frank P. Madsen, President of the Michigan Synod of the United Lutheran Church. Dr. Madsen will also give the message for the day.

Pastor Henneberger, a graduate of Gettysburg College and The Lutheran Seminary of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, the oldest Lutheran school in America, began his ministerial development in the North Farmington area last June. On Oct. 6 a group of 61 interested persons attended the first service in the then uncompleted O. E. DunceLL Junior High School on Twelve Mile Road. A Sunday Church School was begun two weeks later.

On March 16, 1958, the young congregation officially organized. A member of the Lutheran Church with 78 adult members and voted to call Pastor Henneberger as their first full-time pastor. Now numbering 82 members, "the church is named for the first 'mission' congregation in the history of the Christian Church. Acts 1) one can read of the founding of this mission in Antioch north of Palestine. Also significant is the fact that the name 'Christian' was first used at Antioch. In Antioch the disciples were for the first time called 'Christians.'" (Acts 11:26)

Knolls area congregation represents the then uncompleted O. E. DunceLL area all Lutheran bodies in the Northern Lutheran Council, or two-thirds of all Lutherans in America, and is itself a mission of the American Lutheran Church, the largest Lutheran body in America. Sunday Church School begins at 9:30 a.m. and worship at 10:45 a.m. For further information, call MA. 6-5560.
