

Cubs Hold Edge on 1st, Suffer First Defeat

The Star Cutler Cubs hold a slim edge on first place in the Farmington Little League.

In action during the past week they chalked up two victories after taking a 3-0 lead in a game at the hands of the Home-stand Home Tigers.

The masterful two-hit pitching of Danny McKevey was primarily responsible for the Tigers' win over the Cubs.

A home run by Craig Nelson in the first inning started things off for the Tigers. They added three more on singles by Tim Spencer, Gary Lockwood and Tim Marzoff in the second and another on a hit and an error in the third.

In the fourth, Cub starting hurler Bob Ratke was lifted and replaced by Jim Stevenson. The "Tigers" showed little concern, however, and belted him for three more runs.

McKevey struck out 12 Cubs in going the distance. Ratke was charged with the loss, his first of the season.

The Cubs, still hurting from their defeat at the hands of the Tigers, came back later in the week to down the Detroit Bank and Trust Braves, 5-2.
