SMOKE ABATEMENT ORDINANCE An Ordinance to provide for the adoption of the City of Detroit Official Smoke Abatement Code which is Ordinance number 167-E as amended to October 16, 1947 providing for the control of smoke and air pollution within the Township of Farmington, Michigan.

WHEREAS, the excessive emission of dense smoke within the Township of Farmington, Michigan, is a public health and safety hazard and it is the policy of the Township to provide for the administration and enforcement thereof to provide a penalty for the violation of the terms thereof and to repeal all former ordinances and amendments thereto conflicting therewith.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP, Michigan, that the Official Smoke Abatement Code of the City of Detroit, which is Ordinance number 167-E, as amended to October 16, 1947 is hereby adopted and made a part of the laws of Farmington, Michigan.

Section 10. Whenever and wherever the word "Department" is used in the Detroit Smoke Abatement Code, it shall have reference to the Commission of Public Buildings and Building Safety of the Township of Farmington.
