Seniors Take Aptitude Tests

On November 18th and 19th representatives from the Michigan Educational Security Commission were at Clarenceville High to administer the General Aptitude Test Battery to 61 members of the senior class.

The purpose of the test is to establish aptitudes for various types of work. This included not only mental tests, but also tests of manual dexterity. Counseling was also available to the students in addition to the testing procedures.

The results of the tests are placed on file with the Commission in addition to placing the student's name on file for suitable job openings after graduation from school.

The value of this type of testing is not only that it points out the students where their aptitudes may lie, but it also assists them in gaining employment after graduation. This testing and counseling service is available at no cost to the student or the school.

CHS No Match For Northville; 3rd Tough Foe

The Clarenceville Trojans opened an undefeated football season last Friday night by suffering a 45-0 defeat to powerful Northville who went undefeated and untied in Class B competition.

The victory extended the Mustangs winning streak for two seasons to 17 and gave them their 24th victory overall defeat in the Wayne-Oakland Conference.

Although the defeat dimmed a losing season's effort, it is only fair to point out that the Cliffs eleven were called upon to face no less than three state-ranked teams. Besides the Northville team, ranked sixth in class B, Cliffs took on W. E. 1 Bloomfield, rated 9th, and a local Class A team, Farmington, which was ranked 7th statewide.

Highlighting of the season past was the Trojans' lone victory. Before a most appreciative homecoming audience, Don Nelson crossed Michigan's goal line - to bring about the 12-0, rain-soaked, victory margin. This win was a 'must' for the Trojans who averted a league basement in downing the Redskins.

Fish Control Like Farming

Conservation Department fishery workers have produced "exciting" results from recent fish management tests on a few Michigan lakes and ponds.

Many 10-inch bullheads were produced from six-inch fish one year in at least one pond where formerly, only stunted fish were found.

The results stem from "population manipulation" where chemical sprays to remove unwanted fish and plantings replaced desired numbers of same fish.

An acre of water is much like a farm. Half weeds and a half corn may be grown, or corn produced and a high yield of corn removed. The same true of lakes. Within certain limits, modern "farming" practices can make a lake produce fewer weed fish, but more and bigger game fish.

A large number of Michigan lakes now have excess trash and "stunted" panfish populations. Where conditions permit, these lakes can be sprayed to kill unwanted fish and reduce excess panfish populations. Then additional fish, bass, and other predators can be added to keep the lake in better balance.

They Too Must Tighten Belts

Michigan's Conservation Department is on an "austerity" basis caused by recession-hit hunting and fishing license sales, department officials commented.

"The department's game and fish protection fund, which pays the lion's share of law enforcement, fish, game, education and other programs, is up from last year about 30 percent as a result of increased license prices in effect this year. This is not enough to offset earlier deficits and to meet rising operational costs. The result has been restricted programs throughout the state's conservation scene."

"Many equipment purchases have been deferred, and vacant positions are being left unfilled. Various other belt-tightening measures also have been placed in effect in recent months."

"Department officials expect the coming year to see some leveling off if the general economic scene continues to better."
