Relax Work Hr. Law for Minors During Dec. Official notification has been given by Acting Commissioner of Labor, Neil E. McArthur, that the Michigan Department of Labor regulations applying to hours of employment for minors will be relaxed during December.

This relaxation of regulations applies to the retail industry where minors have received a short training course in retailing in accordance with a plan of training between the authorities of the school of which the minor is a pupil and the employer.

The following regulations will be effective beginning December 1 and ending December 31, 1958:

- 1. Minors may not be employed to exceed 18 hours each week and work in any one day.
2. Minors 14-15 years of age may not work between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
3. Minors 16-17 years of age may not work between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
4. The work week of an in-school minor under 18 years of age may not exceed 54 hours.
5. The minor may be employed if the difference between the hours actually spent in classes and 54 hours is not more than 12 hours.
6. The work week for minors may be divided in any manner provided the daily employment does not exceed the provisions set forth in items one through four.
