### Beware of Foreign Bulbs

Detective Captain Genroy Walker, chief of the first marshal division of the Michigan State Police, is warning that some foreign made Christmas tree light bulbs being offered for sale have been found defective by American standards and are dangerous fire hazards.

He recommends that they be tested by lighting them while being hung on the tree. Defective bulbs will either short out, burst into flame or give visible indication of overheating during a 10-minute period.

Well known American brand name Christmas tree bulbs usually have the brand name or trademark stamped on them and can be expected to be in accordance with American standard specifications. It was pointed out, however, that only the wiring, not the bulbs themselves, carry the Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., approval.

### March of Dimes Will Aid in Fight Against Other Dread Diseases

Ernest Goldworthy of Farmington has been appointed Oakland County Director for the 1959 March of Dimes. The annual drive is held in January.

The polo-fighting organization expanding into a broad health program for a year from now to a single disease. Initial new goals include arthritis and birth defects (congenital malformations).

"I am confident that the people of Oakland County, who helped make possible victory over polio their contributions to the March of Dimes over the past twenty years, will give even greater support to the National Foundation's expanded program in the future," the county director said.

"We would like to make it clear, as we begin preparations for the 1959 March of Dimes, that the National Foundation will not abandon polio patients," Goldworthy declared.

It is a moral obligation of the patients of this county to continue to provide needed care and rehabilitation, and we will fulfill this obligation.

The director stressed that a whole solution of the problems of arthritis and birth defects are the immediate need of the March of Dimes, the organization also will follow leads as they develop in the fields of virus research and studies of the central nervous system.

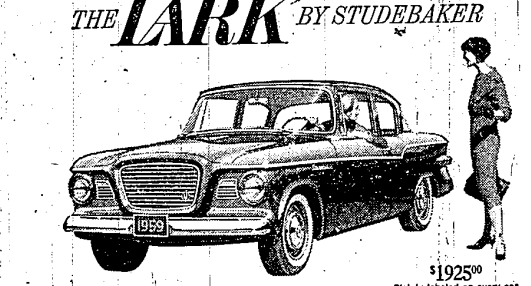
