## Local GOP Women Hear Talk on State Tax Picture

The second meeting of the newly formed Republican Women's Organization of Farmington was held at 8 p.m., November 30, at Farmington Savings and Loan, Ten Mile and Orchard Lake roads.

President, Mrs. Isabel Haynes, presided at the short business meeting.

Arnold Levay, director of Public Relations for the Republican State Central Committee, guest speaker chose "Taxes" as the subject of his informative talk.

He said that basically the tax problem in Michigan is a clash between two parties with separate philosophies. There was no foundation for the Democratic 1949 budget, he commented, and impending disaster was averted by the surplus that had been built up and the corporation tax that was levied. The corporations paid in advance to try to avert the upset which finally started in 1958.

The Republican party proposed borrowing \$100 million with the understanding that it would be paid back with money obtained by levying a one cent sales tax for a period of one year, and wanted the people to vote on this at the April primary, Levay stated. In a Wayne County poll, 51 per cent of the people interviewed favored
