This is not in anticipation of a future demand, but in response to a demand that already exists.

The location is a very desirable one, being located directly on the car line, and is a very pleasant and popular section of the village.

In the opinion of those most competent to judge there is no question but that it will only be necessary to put this on the market to sell it, that it will all be disposed of within the next few weeks.

Mr. Warner is fortunate in being able to secure the Ferry-Mortenson Co. of Detroit to handle the proposition for they have proven their ability to make things go in this line.

They are already building an office on the subdivision and a man will be kept constantly on the job, while a force of salesmen will be at work in the city.
